

City complains over federal spending priorities

Starting in 1987, cuts would be made in federal money earmarked for transportation programs. This proposed cut would eliminate federal funding to the Farmington senior citizen and handicapped transportation programs.

Deadman said he is unsure how proposed cuts in wastewater treatment plants will affect Farmington's participation in the Farmington-Evergreen Sewer System.

"Council realizes that there has to be give in every section of the budget," Deadman said.

The resolution came on the heels of a request by the Michigan Municipal League and National League of Cities (NLC) that local governments begin a process of opposing budget cuts that reduce or in other ways affect local community programs.

NLC officials asked city councils to

adopt resolutions which call for making reductions in programs other than those which would affect local government.

But Farmington officials stopped short of the NLC's request.

The Farmington resolution raises concern over proposed budget cuts

rather than asking the administration to avoid a deficit reduction plan or a proposed tax plan.

"Realistically we believe that something has to be done about the nation's increasing deficit," Deadman said. "We would hope that during the review process Congress would give careful consideration to the impact of all of the proposed cuts."

With an estimated \$200 billion federal deficit in 1985, Reagan proposes more rounds of domestic spending cuts, said Alan Beale, NLC executive director.

According to Beale, the Reagan administration's proposal includes freezing programs at existing funding levels, cutting some back and in other cases eliminating programs altogether.

Examples of the programs that

would be affected, according to Beale, are Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), housing assistance, Small Business Administration, transportation, food stamps, environmental programs, community service grants and legal aid and general revenue sharing.

Another part of the federal deficit reduction plan includes several modifications in the tax credit and tax deduction program. A facet of the plan includes eliminating interest on revenue and industrial development bonds which are used in redevelopment of cities.

The Treasury Department also plans to eliminate state and local tax deductions from federal income tax.

"The council doesn't believe any, but one, of the cuts are sacred," Deadman said.

Alcoholism examined at student symposium

The timely topic of alcohol abuse will undergo a specifically student treatment at the Jan. 25 Detroit Country Day Upper School Symposium: "Drink, Drank, Drunk: Alcohol and You."

Not only has the daylong program been planned by students for students, the topic itself was voted in by students over an earlier choice after 61 one-day suspensions were given by the school administration last October to students who attended an off-campus party where beer was served.

The Country Day symposium will be presented by the student council from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 25, in the Learning Center on the main campus at 13 Mile and Lahser roads in Birmingham.

Its young planners stress that the day's objective is to educate the student body, not to lecture at it.

"The whole purpose is to help the students — give them the information

they need to make their own responsible decisions and to know where to go or who to turn to if they need help," said Rick Malicki, symposium director and a junior at Detroit Country Day School.

"We chose our speakers not only for their expertise but according to how well we thought students would relate to them. We included four short films because teen-agers identify with movies and because these films picture students in real-life situations involving alcohol. We scheduled several breaks to encourage students to talk among themselves," added Brian Gimotty, a senior and president of the Upper School Student Council.

Speakers at the symposium will include: Ted Lindsay, former Detroit Red Wings hockey coach; Jack Gregory, Birmingham psychologist and certified alcohol and drug counselor; and Dennis Wholey, Channel 56 television personality and popular host of PBS' "La-

te Night America."

The day will begin with a welcome by Headmaster Richard Schlegel, who initiated the concept of a biennial student symposium as part of Country Day's leadership education and is especially pleased with the students' response this year.

During the morning session, Ted Lindsay will lead student discussion of a film on drunk driving titled "Kevin's Story."

At 1:30 p.m. Brian Gimotty will introduce the film: "It Can't Happen to Me."

Dennis Wholey, who recently completed a nationwide tour promoting his new book about alcoholism, "The Courage to Change," accepted the students' invitation because of his belief that teen-agers, particularly, need to be informed about alcoholism. He will speak at 2:15 p.m. concluding with a candid question and answer session.

Students from Brother Rice, Catholic Central, Cranbrook, Kingswood, Marian, Sacred Heart and University Liggett high schools have been invited to participate in the symposium.
