ACCORDING TO Beals, the Reagan administration's proposal includes freezing programs at existing funding levels, cutting some back and in other cases eliminating programs altogether. Examples of the programs that

would be affected, according to Beals, are Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), bousing assistance, Small Business Administration, transportation, food stamps, environmental programs, community service grants and legal aid and general revenue sharing.

Another part of the federal deficit reduction plan includes several modifications in the tax credit and tax deduction program. A facet of the plan includes eliminating interest on revenue and iodustrial development bonds and iodustrial development of clicks.
