Woman taken from station

Detroit police arrested a man early Friday morning suspected of trying to abduct a woman in Farmington Hills and possibly abducting and raping a woman from West Bloomfield. Subarban officers had few details of the Detroit arrest before pressime Friday, but L. Norman Kilmer of Farmington Hills Police Department said. "It's probably the same guy we had out here."

According to Kilmer, a man match-ing the suspect's description tried to abduct a female attendant from the Union 76 service station near Middle-beit and 10 Mile about 5:45 a.m. Fri-day. That was just hours after a female attendant from a Union 76 station in West Bloomfield was abducted by two men, sexually assaulted and released in Detroit. However, in the West Bloom-field case, two men were involved and their descriptions differed from the Farmington Hills case.

IN THE FARMINGTON Hills Inci-IN THE FAININGTON Hills inci-dent, a customer walking lino the sta-tion interrupted the abduction, Kilmer sald. "The man came in with a gun of some type, tried to get the attendant working there to leave with him. She resisted. A customer came in and he stuck the gun in his pocket and ieft." The attendant and customer de-scribed the man as white, 6 feet, 200 pounds, in his 30s, with dark hair, mus-tache and dark-colored clothes. The man was driving a 1978 Chevro-let two-door, Kilmer said.

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Council set to discuss surplus funds

Farmington Hills officials prefer us-ing the words reserve funds rather than surplus when it comes to talking about city finances.

And talking about the money that over the years has been pigeonholed in various funds for various reasons will be one of council's topics of discussion at 7:30 tonight.

The city's surplus is often a sore sub-ject with council members when budg-et line rolls around in Jone. But Coun-climan Charles Williams didn't wait until budget time this year before rais-ing the issue.

IN EARLY January, Williams asked City Manager William Costick to pro-vide council with a report of the city's reserve funds -- both those that legally can and cannot be used for purposes other than originally established.

In Costick's report to council, which is to be discussed tonight, he indicated that up to \$630,000 can be reallocated from some of the city's reserves for

capital improvements. Williams' request for the report came during a discussion of the city's sixyear capital improvements plan and how city officials planned to fund the listed projects.

At that time, council members passed a resolution showing their "will-ingness" to raise taxes to finance capi-tal improvements in 1985-86.

"Rainy day funds are nice. But the rainy day is here," Williams said in early January.

Torch results in blaze

Warning up exterior pipes with a blow torch has been blamed for a fire which caused an estimated \$6,000 dam-age to two units in the Green Hill Apartment complex in Farmington Hills last weck, according to lite offi-ciats. Fireflighters were called to 21534 Green Hill at 332 pm. Last Wednesday – almost 24 hours after workers used a blow torch to warn the pipes on the outside of a building which houses eight apartments. The complex is on Nine Nine Road, a half-mile west of Drake. When a blow torch was used on the pipes, the heat was transmitted to the fiscide walls of the apartment building, said Fire Chief Richard Mariaucz.

THE HEAT caused a smouldering fire between the interior dry wall and the exterior brick that later ignited, Marinucci said.
