erated briefly before being closed down by weather.

"This spring will be its first real test," said Desmond P. Hamill, architect for the Farmington Schools. "On

sunny days it will heat the pool — that's its first job."

"We're talking to the low bidders now to see if there's anything we can do to resolve it," he said.

And another financial problem has surfaced.

"They ran out of (federal and state) funds when they got to East Middle School," Lawing said. "We were the last school approved, so we got only the remaining funds."

"But it ran short of 50 percent. If anyone turns back any money because they're not using it, we should get our funding full."

Work will begin immediately on the items priced under \$5,000, Lawing said. Other items will have to be approved by the board of education at its next meeting.

Police chief chosen

Speaking to the Farmington Hills council Monday, Dwyer said Hart "encouraged me to pursue my professional growth and be open to innovative methods of police work."

"I am indebted to him for showing me, during my four years as his aide, that a chief of police only succeeds to the extent that he involves the community in policing and is responsive to the men and women who work for him."

Dwyer said his background and assignments in various areas — narcotics division, Federal Bureau of Investigation and Secret Service training, head

of security at the GOP Convention, labor relations, program and activity development and community relations — "will enhance my abilities here."

Dwyer added that he has built up a good rapport with state and federal law enforcement officials, as well as with other suburban police departments.

"I think that knowing the state, local and federal people will be a great asset to running the Farmington Hills department," Dwyer said.

Dwyer holds a bachelor's degree from Mercy College of Detroit and a master's degree in criminal justice from Wayne State University.

Said Lawing, "If we were going to be real efficient, we'd have to construct a large storage vault to hold all the (sun-heated) heated water."

The district hopes to recover most of the cost of the program through savings on utility bills, Lawing said.

"The energy savings should pay for the changes within an average of about 2½ years," he added. "Some pay for themselves a lot sooner than others."

The district will pay about half of the cost of the improvements. The rest of the money will be provided by state and federal grants. An immediate problem, Lawing said, is that the project is a bit over budget.

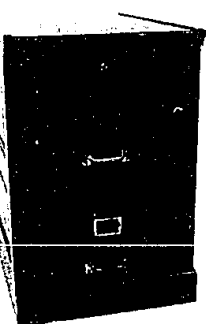

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING JANUARY 28, 1985

Mayor Dolan opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on January 28, 1985 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Dolan, Dudley, Mas, Scrimen, Williams, and Wolf. Absent: Alkateer. Others present: City Manager Costick, City Clerk Reynolds, and City Attorney Bibeau.

Minutes of January 1, 1985 were approved as presented and Minutes of January 14, 1985 were approved as amended.

Mayor Dolan presented a Resolution to the family of Earl Teeplee, who recently passed away. Mr. Teeplee was a former Farmington Township Police Officer and former Township Supervisor.

Council appointed William J. Dwyer, Chief of Police, replacing John Nichols. Chief Dwyer will commence his duties the week of February 11, 1985.

Council adopted Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance for the City of Farmington Hills City Code, No. C-2-85, Chapter 60 and the Summary was approved for publication.

Council Adopted Zoning Map Amendment to the City Code No. C-2-85, ZR PG-10-84 from RA-1 to OS-1A on the south side of Twelve Mile Road, east of Habled.

E.D.C. Resolution No. 1 was adopted, approving the Project Area and Project District E.D.C. Resolution No. 2 was adopted, confirming the appointment of Harlem Morris and Donald Meade as additional directors for the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan, Inc. Project.

Council granted an extension of the final preliminary plat of Strathmore Subdivision to expire on January 19, 1987.

Council approved the expenditure of \$53.00 for the Michigan Municipal League Regional Meeting to be held on February 7, 1985 and the expenditure of \$120.00 for the Legislative Conference to be held on February 27, 1985.

Robert J. Clark was reappointed to the Pension Committee for a three year period to George A. Beaulieu.

Council granted extension of Open Space Completion Date of Farmington Ridge Subdivision, Section 6 until June 1, 1985, contingent upon the receipt of the open space escrow amount of \$10,000.00.

Council voted to transfer \$770,000.00 from the Working Capital Reserve Fund into the Capital Improvement Fund for the construction of the new Police Facility.

Traffic Control Orders SL-92-1985 and SL-93-1985 were adopted for Speed Control on sections of Eight Mile Road.

Traffic Control Orders SL-90-1985 and SL-91-1985 were adopted for Speed Control on sections of Twelve Mile Road.

Council scheduled the date of Sunday, February 10, 1985 from 12:00 noon-3:00 p.m. for a Special City Council Work Meeting.

Council scheduled an Executive Session immediately following tonight's meeting to discuss pending litigation.

Council reviewed meeting held on January 22, 1985 regarding the proposed SP-5 zone for the Sisters of Mercy Senior Housing Project, discussing Farmington/Evergreen Sewer Interceptor capacity.

Meeting adjourned at 10:15 p.m.
