The child assault proposal would, if passed, repeal the crimes of child cruelty and child torture and would replace them with the crime of child assault. It would also establish several degrees of assault.

Under the plan, first-degree assault would be punishable by any term of years to life in prison. Second-degree

assault would be punishable by a maximum of 20 years, while third-degree assault would be punishable by a maximum 10-year sentence. Current law provides maximum penanyters for a child original penanyters and four years for a child original penanyters and four years for a child cruelty conviction in some cases, it has been difficult to get courts to issue warrants and to agree to prosecute. 
