A bumpy nightmare for winter motorists

Sit in any coffee shop, stand in a groccy checkout laine, wait in an auto repair shop and talk will eventually turn to this winter's potholes. Everywhere motorists can be heard complaining that the dips, holes and cracks of the area's roads are worse than last year.

And in some cases they are.

The same reply is offered in Farmington Hills where most of the well-traveled roads are under Dakland County jurisdiction. In the long run, it is probably very similar to past years even though this thaw has been very bad," said David Called Languige of Hills engineer.

AFTER DAYS OF rain at the end of December followed by an ice storm on New Year's, water already in the cracks of roads froze as well as softened the road's base. Because water expands when it freezes, the road begins to crack further, Pagot said. With the recent quick thaw, the roads began crumbling around the cracks, he said.

"As long as there are cracks (in the roads) there will be potholes," Pagot said.

What makes the whole mess even more noticeable is that the thaw this winter arrived about a month earlier than usual, said from Biasell, Farmington Hills Department of Public Services director.

Because many of the well-traveled

roads in Farmington Hills are county roads — Farmington, Orchard Lake, Middlebelt, Haggerty, 12 Mile — much of the concern about potholes centers on the city's gravel and subdivision roads.

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On the other hand, most of Farmington's 35 miles of roads are paved and under the city's jurisdiction. Portions of Orchard take and Farmington roads are under the county's jurisdiction.

"Being small, were able to do a little better job than the larger places." Billings said. But roads which are in good shape to begin with have fewer problems with potholes when winter comes, he added.

That's the problem Oakland County.

That's the problem Oakland County is Jacing, Pagot said.

Because funding over the last few years "has not been sufficient" to keep up with the repair and maintenance needs of the county roads, many of them are in less than "ideal" shape, Pagot said.

them are in less man lucas supported in the probability of 12 Mile, is probably the most notorious for potholes in the Farming-notorious for potholes in the Farming-ton area. But as a county road, it's up to the county to do the repairs. The

road, bowever, is targeted for major repairs this spring and early summer, according to Biasell.

In fact, residents in the subdivisions along the thoroughfare say they often hear the clang of a hubcap after an un-fortunate motorist tills one of the many potholes on Farmington Road.

while each jurisdiction is having its own problem with potholes, both the cities and the county road crews have spent the water trying to fill up as many as they can. "We've been patching portholes all winter," Pagot said, adding that the county spends about \$1.8 million annually on patching the roads. "It's very hard to keep up with it. We try to get the worse ones first," Pagot continued, adding that many residents call to let road officials how exactly where the most bothersome potholes are located.

Work crews in Farmlogton and
Farmlogton Hills are usually out every
day repairing the holes in the road,
And like the county, local road crews
try to fix the worst of the bunch.
As far as the gravel roads, such as

Drake in Farmington Hills though, a fix-up will have to wait until spring or when the grounds thaws a bit so the road can be filled in and graded, Call said.

ALTHOUGH DRIVERS and their passengers can be seen cringing as the edge of a front tire clips a pothole, area repair abops are reporting few, if any, repairs due to pothole damage. The American Automobile Association (AAA)in Deathorn is reporting few insurance claims due to pothole damage.



In January overall insurance claims through AAA are up about 8 percent over January 1884, according Jerry Cheskey, AAA spokensma. But most of the claims, he said, are not for auto damage caused by potholes. In fact, he said, most of the damage from potholes is so minor that it isn't covered by insurance.

Managers and workers at some of
the area's repair shops also say they
have yet to make any repairs for damsage due to potholes.

it's a busy time of the year for road repair crews. These two trucks are smoothing out Power road




The spring thaw, accompanied by heavy rains, made diving haz-ardous and slowed down repair efforts.
