by Stevenson public address announcer George Croll.
The crowd on both sides of the gym stood in unison, politely applauding the state's winningest active coach for almost two minutes.

WatWagoner, who decided two Months ago that this would be his 33rd and final season of prep coaching, was taken by surprise by the anouncement.

I didn't know he (Croll) was going to do that, he said. I was just thinking (during the appliause) how I appreciated this team and I was doing a

little praying that they might win be-cause they were deserving. "I felt bad for them. I told them not to hang their heads."

STEVENSON'S CENTER Bob Sluka told the retiring coach afterward: "I'm sorry we couldn't win it for you, coach."
"That's the way he is," 'van Wagoner said. "He never gives up, and I'm sure the others felt the same way."
Van Wagoner is by no means through with the 1984-85 season.
He'll attempt to record his 493rd

coaching victory Wednesday night when the Spartans return to the court (at Livonia Churchill) to face city rival Frankiln in the first round of the state tournament.

Stevenson, which finished the regular season at 17-3, is favored to win the Churchill fitsirct.

If Stevenson can conquer the Churchill field, it would be VanWagoner's 15th district title. VanWagoner, who has had only four losing seasons in 33 years, is 492-206 overall. He also has four regional and 13 conference titles to his credit.
