dents do not spend their school day only in the resource room but take time from the regular classroom, Ankele

said.

Even after the state rules were revised in 1880, districts' resource rooms were still not acknowledged as a means of helping special education students even though most districts used this concept. Ankele said.

While glad the state is proposing recognition of resource rooms, local educators claim state education officials have gone far beyond what they would have liked.

The proposed changes would designate what type of service a resource room teacher can and cannot provide

The proposed changes also call for the addition of educational consultants to work with the resource room teach-

Resource room teachers have provided students with a spectrum of services including evaluations, referrals, counseling and interaction with other staff members.

The proposed changes also call for immiting an educational consultant's caseload to 25 students.

"They have a very varied role in trying to coordinate services," Ankele said.

UNDER THE proposed changes, however, an educational consultant would compensate for what the teacher would be unable to do, such as providing evaluations and working with social workers and psychologists. That would restrict the resource room teacher to the classroom, Ankele said.

"Their ability to support general ed-ucation teachers would be severely curtailed," Ankele said. "Teachers feel it inhibits their role to comprehensive-ly deal with students.




