

Opponent william Armstrong, R. Colo., Sald "the solution to the farm problem (and) a whole box of problems plaguing the nation is to reduce government spending."
Senators voting yes favored the emergency farm legislation Michigan Democrats Carl Levin and Donald Riegle voted yes.
