## Probe of crash continues

An investigation into an auto accident in Farmington Hills that killed two West Bloomfield sisters is continuing.

The girls, Vanessa Carloni, 16, and Lara Carloni, 15, died March 10 when the car they were riding in collided with another on Farmington Road just south of 14 Mile Road.

The driver of the car, Brian Smith, 17, of Southfield, was in fair condition Friday at Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak. A passenger in the Smith car, 16-year-old Michael Altman of Southfield, remained in critical condition Friday at Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills.

## Cops probe fatality

Farmington Hills Police and Michigan State Police are investigating an auto accident in Farmington Hills that killed a Birmingham woman last Monday.

Beverly Lambert, 20, was dead on arrival at Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills. The other driver,

The driver of the other car, 21-year-old Laura Pini of Birmingham, was in stable condition Friday at Botsford. A passenger in her car, Charles Sirola, 24, of Southfield, was treated at Botsford and released the day of the accident.

"We're waiting for the autopsy results on the two girls, and the final report from the State Police," Lt. Ernie Miller, head of the traffic division for the Farmington Hills police, said Friday.

A Michigan State Police accident reconstructionist investigated the accident.

"Then we'll be ready to submit our case to the prosecutor's office," Miller said.

The county medical examiner will determine the cause of death for the Carloni sisters, he said.

"Before the prosecutor will issue a warrant, he has to have the cause of death. It usually takes two to three weeks to get the medical examiner's report. We're hoping for next week."

The police have blood test results for the two drivers, but are not yet releasing those results.

"Not until we go to the prosecutor's office," Miller said Friday.

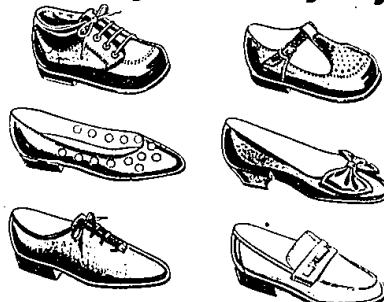

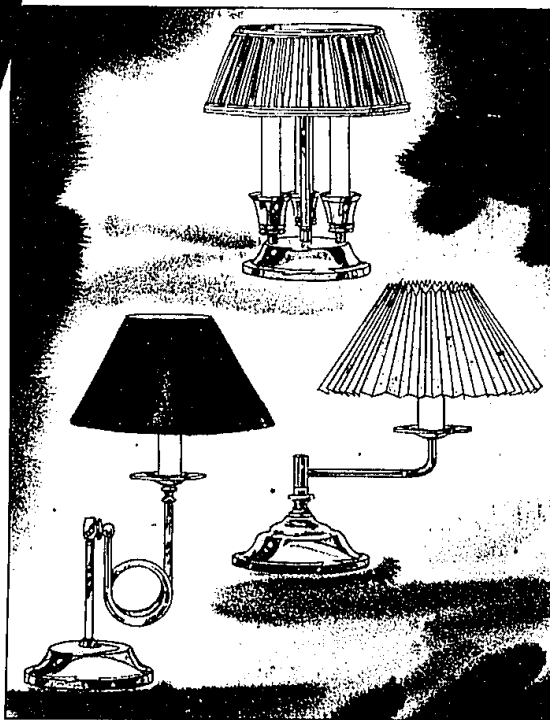
