

Firsts in the field propel Harrison

Farmington Harrison swept to wins in all five field events and captured 11 of 17 firsts in trouncing Waterford Mott 85-43 Thursday in a boys track meet at Mott.

Freshman Brian Soeder captured the long jump (18-9) and tied with teammate Rich Esker for first in the 120-yard hurdles (18.4). Other winners in field events were George Sarcevic in the shot put (41-6 1/4), Paul Riggio in the discus (120-10), Scott Blase in the high jump (5-5) and John Wank in the pole vault (11-6).

On the track, Aaron Yaverski was first in the 100-yard dash (10.8); Dean Werba won the 220 (24.7); Roger Haney took the 440 (55.9); and Chris Hart finished on top in the mile (4:52.0).

Riggio, Bill Wood, Yaverski and Mike Hart combined to win the 440 relay (47.2).

The win increased Harrison's dual meet record to 2-0, with a home meet Tuesday against Livonia Bentley next.

N. FARMINGTON 76, FRANKLIN 61: Two firsts from Lee Elksorm and wins in three relays powered visiting North Farmington past Livonia Franklin Thursday in both teams' first Northwest Suburban League meet.

Elksorm was a winner in the 110-meter hurdles (11.8) and the 200 (24.1). Other individual firsts went to Brian Hood in the discus (133-0); Warren Johnson in the long jump (18-10); Dale Glenshaw in the high jump (5-10); Carl Yaquinto in the pole vault (9-6); and Kirk Armstrong in the 1,600 (4:58.0).

Mark Weintraub, Hood, Chris Christman and Elksorm combined for a win in the 400 relay (46.1). Johnson, Adam Khan, Armstrong and Chris Woj were first in the 1,600 relay (3:43.0), and Rocky Nili, Mike Bindon, Jason Panich and Armstrong teamed for a first in the 3,200 relay (9:00.0).

Final relay lifts North

North Farmington trailed in its Northwest Suburban League (NSL) girls track opener against Livonia Franklin Thursday until freshman Julie Garczynski took the baton from Carolyn Alkon and started her leg of the 1,600-meter relay.

Garczynski overtook her Franklin foe and relay mates Monica Denis and Terri Spengler kept the Raiders ahead as they won the event (4:28.0) that gave them the meet, 65-63, at North.

The victory kept North unbeaten after 2 duals. Franklin is 4-2.

An important event for the Raiders was the 3,200. They swept the top 3 spots, with freshman Donna Chuba first (13:17.0), Alice Jewell second and Cindy Nevers third.

FARMINGTON 67, CHURCHILL 61: The Falcons evened their record at 1-1 behind double wins by Lori Casaroli

and Alyse Fortune Thursday at Farmington.

Casaroli's wins were in the 110-yard (18.8) and 330-yard (52.7) hurdles. Fortune was first in the long jump (15-9 1/4) and 100 (12.3).

Farmington's only other winners were Jenny Lindbert, whose first in the 2 mile (15:08.0) clinched the victory, and the 440 (53.9) and 2 mile (11:07.0) relays.

The loss dropped Livonia Churchill to 0-2.

HARRISON 107, MOTT 21: Senior Tracy Brod and sophomore Jenny Anderson guided Farmington Harrison's rout of Waterford Mott with 2 individual victories Thursday at Harrison. Brod won the discus (91-3 1/4) and 400-

meter run (1:02.8), while Anderson was first in the 800 (2:41.0) and 3,200 (13:33.0).

Harrison won 12 of 16 events, including all 4 relays. Individual winners were Lisa Anna in the shot put (26-11 1/4); Tracey Solomon in the high jump (4-8); Jamie Holcomb in the 300 hurdles (49.6); and Kim Hart in the 1,600 (6:07.0).

Jill Biersa, Tracy Smith, Jamie Lyons and Holcomb combined for wins in the 400 (55.4) and 800 (1:55.9) relays. Brod, Renee Praznowski, Beth Christie and Holcomb teamed for a win in the 1,600 relay (4:30.5), and Hart, Sherri Novis, Anderson and Brod captured the 3,200 relay (11:07.0).

The victory raised Harrison's record to 2-0.

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

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
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
