21-month-old battler waits for chance at life

Say I'm weary, say I'm sad, Say that health and wealth have missed me, Say I'm growing old, but add, Jenny kissed me.

POET LEIGH HUNT wrote this short, memorable poem. And a few short days ago, I was reminded of "Jenny Kissed Me" when Brandon Weiss lifted up his chubby arms, smiled, and begged me to pick him tallo mulcally.

up in my arms.

Hugging this little fellow, just 21 months
old, whose slim chance for life hinges on a bone marrow transplant, I was touched. Yes, Brandon touched me, both the child

A recent Thursday, a call had come into our office, a plea for help for a bone marrow donor, someone whose tissue will prove compatible to Brandon's. Could we do a story?
Two hours later, we were in the Weiss' Southfield home, meeting Brandon, his mother, Gayle, his sister, Layne, 3, and Basha, the Polish woman who cares for the kids and helps Gayle Weiss. Just beginning to walk, already talking, Brandon is a chubby, curly-haired doll who has been plagued by illness all his life. Doctors recognized aplastic anemia at his birth, and at lx months his first hospitalization took place. He has had tests and transfusions ever since, in an effort to keep him alive until a transplant can be arranged.

IN APLASTIC ANEMIA the bone mar-

IN APLASTIC ANEMIA the bone mar-row system which manufactures white cells, red cells, and platelets fails. The pa-tient's immune system is damaged, infec-tion cannot be fought, and spontaneous bleeding is a constant danger. All of this means that Brandon is in jeop-

ardy.

Arthur Welss, his father, said Brandon is a "walking time bomb" with poor resistance to viruses or other routine illa.

Stories about Brandon started the phones ringing at Beaumont Hospital and Dr. Charles Main's (pediatric bematologist) office has received hundreds of calls in just days.

days. Somewhere there's a person whose tis-

sue is compatible with Brandon's, but that occurs only once in 10,000 or even less, according to medical experts.

WEISS, AN attorney, often is inter-viewed on television. Now appearances to beg for volunteers to be tissue typed brings the agony of going public about his person-

the agony of going public about his personal life.

"But he's our son. We don't want to lose Brandon. He's got to have every chance," the father says.

"People are calling, volunteering and sending cards and letters and we're so grateful. Tell them to keep them coming," he told me.

Welss is checred, too, that appeals to regular platelet donors at the Red Cross seem to be moving them, causing them to request records which may show tissue compatability with Brandon.

"Platelet donors are already tissue typed, so if they volunteer, it skips about five steps," Welse sxplains.

THE HUNT for a non-related donor is THE HONE for a non-related door is on because family members were found incligible. Recently, an out-of-state donor was located. The Weisses thought they were home free, until it was discovered she has breast cancer and cannot do the trans-

plant.
Only a few bone marrow transplants between non-related donors have succeeded anywhere up to now. Dr. A. William Shafer, director of the American Red Cross Southeastern Michigan Center, cautions that the procedure is highly experimental and potential donors must be apprised there are risks.

Appointments for tissue typing are being made at Beaumont and Mott Children's Hospital, Ann Arbor. Potential donors can be anyone over 10 years of age. Only 12-15 studies a day can be done.

IT DOESN'T cost the donor anything be-cause the family is picking up any expense over that covered by insurance. And it only

over that covered by insurance. And it only takes a few minutes.

So when you call to volunteer (288-8270 for Beauthont or 1-784-2220 for Mott U-M) during business hours, they'll tell you the first appointment is sometime in July at Beaumont or just two to three weeks hence if you can make it to Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor.

Put it on your calendar and go. I've already penciled in Wednesday, July 17. You see, Brandon touched me.
