

# Hawks run strong, still lose

It's one thing to lose a track meet. But when you run your best and still lose — well, what are you going to do? Such was the fate of the Farmington Harrison boys track team Tuesday as they lost to Livonia Bentley 72 1/4-64 1/4. "Our kids did a sensational job," said Hawk coach John Schumacher. "But it just wasn't good enough. Bentley was just a better team." Bentley clinched the win by taking the 1,600-meter relay in 3:36.4. Harrison got a pair of firsts from both Lamont Burgess and Aaron Yverski. Burgess won both the 110-meter

high hurdles (16.22) and the 300 low hurdles (41.3). Yverski, a freshman, won the 100 (12.2) and 200 (24.46) dashes. Scott Bissett got the only first for Harrison on the track. He won the 400 in 54.46. The Hawks cleaned up in the field events. George Saravich won the shot put (43.14). Paul Riggle took discus honors (123.5). Brian Seider won the long jump (19.24) and John Waak took the pole vault (11-6). But Bentley (4-1) won all four relays to overcome the Hawks (2-1).

FARMINGTON, after a tough loss to Livonia Churchill last Thursday, came back with an easy 103-33 rout of Walled Lake Western Tuesday. The Falcons won 16 of the 19 events. Craig Petersmark and Mike Forge

won two events each. Petersmark won the shot put (46-8) and the discus (132-1). Forge won the 100-yard dash (10.6) and the 440 (52.6). Other individual winners were Ab Hazen in the high jump (6-0), Dan Clapson in the pole vault (11-0), Greg Minawasser won the 330-low hurdles (43.6), Nathan Case in the 220 (24.1), Bruce Kraat in the 880 (2:09.8), Chris Inch in the mile (4:47.0) and Brian Lawton in the 2 mile (10:38.0). The Falcons (2-1) took the 440 relay (46.7), the 880 relay (1:36.2) and the 2 mile relay (8:47.2).

# Marathon champ reaps reward

"It hasn't been that long (since she won)," Weidenbach said. "It's only been a week, so I haven't really gotten any calls for appearances. I've been out of town anyway." MANY OF THE top women's runners bypassed Boston, mainly because the committee that runs the race refuses to give appearance fees. "The store company (Saucony) produces a bonus for winning the race," she said. "I'll come out of this nicely. "But I think Boston ought to change with the times. They have the publicity, the fans and the media coverage, but not the incentives or the money. I gave them (the press) my opinion. "People are going to Rotterdam and London (marathons) instead of Boston. I might go back to Boston, but I if I don't, I won't use the word boycott."

JULIE ISPIHORDING, who nipped Weidenbach at the finish line for the

third and final spot on the U.S. Olympic team during last year's U.S. Olympic Trials Marathon, bypassed Boston in favor of next month's marathon in Pittsburgh, where the top prize is \$20,000. "They're offering \$20,000 (to the winner), not including appearance fees," Weidenbach added. "I considered going this year. They're going to have to change it Boston." The weekend after Weidenbach's triumph, Ingrid Kristiansen of Norway broke the women's world marathon record in London with time of 2:21:56, almost 1 1/2 minutes better than Benoit's mark of 2:22:45, set at Boston in 1983.

Kristiansen won a total of \$75,000, one of the biggest payoffs in marathon history. She earned a \$50,000 bonus for breaking Benoit's mark. "MY REACTION to that was 'What the hell a lot of work to do,' Weiden-

bach said. "I think I would have placed third in that race."

Weidenbach, who began running only five years ago after being an All-American swimmer, will continue intensive training right through the 1988 U.S. Olympic Trials.

"I race frequently, but I run only two marathons a year," she said. "I'm going to the Cascade Run-off (marathon) in October in Portland, Ore. "I'm taking things easy right now. I was tired (after the marathon) because every weekend in March, up until Boston, I had raced."

Weidenbach's husband, a Grosse Pointe native and marathoner himself, supports his wife's efforts, but the two do not train together.

"We might go on morning runs together," said Lisa. "But we have major efforts on two different levels. I don't want to take away from the glory or concentration. You tend to be selfish when training intensively."

The reasons for the Weidenbach's move to Massachusetts was Bill's job and Lisa's training. "I'm also much more marketable out there," Lisa added.

# Clarkston takes Andover Relays

Clarkston High School ran off with first-place ribbons in three events to capture its first-ever championship in the sixth annual Bloomfield Hills Andover High School Co-ed Relays held Saturday.

The Wolves led the 16-team field with 88 points, followed by Millford (75), Pontiac Northern (64), Rochester (48) and the host Barons (47).

Rochester — which came into the relays as defending champion — and Millford have each won two co-ed titles. Royal Oak Dondoro, and now Clarkston, each own one crown.

"This was by far the biggest meet we've ever had," said Andover coach and meet organizer Paul Dain. "Every year it gets a little more popular and we pick up a few more schools. It's the only one of its kind that I know of in this state."

"In this type of meet it's the overall team depth which really makes the difference. You have to have a good balance between sprint and distance events."

"Millford, for example, won only one event but yet they finished way up there," he said. "They showed their depth with a lot of second and third places."

CLARKSTON'S wins were in the Sprint Medley Relay, the Shot-Discus Relay and the 4-by-100 Relay.

Like the Wolves, Andover won four events. The difference, however, was Clarkston finished among the top three squads in six other events while Andover did not earn one second- or third-place finish.

The Barons wins were in the 4-by-3200 Relay, the Distance Medley Relay and the 4-by-1,600 Relay.

Troy Athens, which placed eighth overall, won the 4-by-800 Relay and
