Doctor S, one of our most valued cli-ents, has been concerned about sub-stantial equity in his home, Mr. L has a similar problem.

More than 10 million older Ameri-

More than 10 million older Americans now own their homes without any outstanding mortgage. Many of those homes have built up a sizable equity. But how does an owner get at it without selling out?

Lenders offer several programs to help cash-short homeowners ratee their mentally incomes by drawing upon the equity in their homes. The Seante Committee on Aging provides the following examples of home-equity conversions.

Reverse-Annuity Mortgage (RAM)

A RAM is a loan against the equity in

your home, paid to you in monthly installments over a set period of time, often 10 years.

In a 10-year loan with a fixed inter-est rate of, say, 14 percent, plus some fees and some other charges, equity of \$120,000 would provide a monthly in-come of \$463.

After 10 years, you would have to re-pay or renegotiate the loan.

Sale and Lease-Back (SLB)

In this plan, the investor buys your home, often at a discounted price, and you retain the right to rent it for the remainder of your life or for a more limited time.

You can receive payment in a lump sum or divided into equal monthly pay-ments based upon an annunity bought by the investor. If you wish, you can have your rent deducted from the monthly mortgage payment you

Deferred-Payment Loan (DPL)

With this type of loan, you borrow against your equity and defer payment of all principal and interest either for a specified term or until you sell your house.

A DPL can be helpful if you need cash, for example, to fix up your house before selling it.
