

Bizarre ending, Bentley jolts Farmington

The Farmington boys track team has lost only two dual meets in the last 2 1/2 years — but Thursday's 69%-67% loss to Livonia Bentley may be remembered for a long, long time in Farmington.

At the conclusion of the meet, Farmington thought it had won and Bentley walked to its bus thinking it had been defeated. Both coaches, so confident that the meet had been decided, experimented with younger runners in the final event.

Then the score was recalculated. Earlier in the meet, the discus score had been counted twice giving Farmington an extra 15 points it hadn't

earned. When the error was discovered, the Bentley players celebrated hysterically.

The Bentley victory has serious ramifications in the Western Lakes Division. Bentley is now undefeated in the division. For Farmington to win the division title, Bentley must lose. The league meet will decide the overall Western Lakes champion.

As it turned out, the final event (the mile relay) decided the meet's winner. Bentley captured that race in 3:45.8.

But Falcon coach Dave Catherman wasn't about to blame the loss on the scoring mix-up.

"Hey, that was just one of three or

four things that didn't go right for us," the veteran coach said.

The Falcons took a commanding lead out of the field events. Craig Petracum won both the shot put (40-11) and the discus (128-2). Brian Looser won the high jump (5-10) and Dave Cunningham captured the long jump (18-10 1/4).

Both Looser and Cunningham were double winners for the Falcons. Looser won the 220-yard dash (23.75) and Cunningham won the 440 (54.46).

Al Stebbins won the mile in 4:39.0. But the Falcons were beaten in five of the eight individual track events.

And, Bentley managed to take three of

the four relays. Farmington's lone relay win came in the 800 (1:35.4).

Bentley, having its best season in recent memory, is 7-1 overall and 4-0 in the Western Lakes. Farmington is 5-2 overall and 2-2 in the conference.

FARMINGTON HARRISON used double victories from Lamont Burgess and Chris Hill to dispose of Northville Thursday 65-52.

Burgess won both hurdle events, the 120-yard highs (16.69) and the 330 lows (41.4). Hart won the mile (4:43.0) and the two mile (10:34.0).

Other Harrison winners were George Sarcevich in the shot put (44-10 1/4),

Paul Riggio in the discus (122-9) and John Wask in the pole vault (12-9).

Dean Werba anchored a pair of relay wins for the Hawks. He brought home the 440 relay in 47.0 and the 880 relay in 1:40.8.

The Hawks (3-2) also won the two-mile relay in 8:44.0.

NORTH FARMINGTON lost its first Northwest Suburban League dual meet of the season Thursday, falling to Garden City 76 1/2-60 1/2.

The Raider loss creates a three-way tie atop the NSL. North, Garden City and John Glenn all share 2-1 records.

Garden City won 10 of 12 track events, including all four relays, to put North away.

North won three of the five field events with Dale Elmbaum taking the high jump (5-8). Brian Hood the discus (139-3 1/4) and freshman Warren Johnson winning the long jump (17-4 1/4).

Rocky Hill won the 880-yard run (2:17.0) and Mark Weintraub took the 100-yard dash (11:08).

David Lee won both hurdle events (16.53 in the highs and 42.37 in the lows) and Dave Homann won both the mile (4:27.8) and 2 mile (10:08.9).

North is 3-3 overall.

Hawks remain undefeated in WLAA

A strong performance in the field events enabled the Farmington Harrison girls track team to escape Northville Thursday, 67-61, and remain undefeated in the Western Lakes.

The Hawks, still feeling the effects of Tuesday's Farmington City Meet, pulled 1-2-3 sweeps in both the long jump and discus, and a 1-2 in shot put — they needed every point because the Hawks won only four events on the track.

"We were very flat," said Hawk coach Mark Babcock. "It seems that my cat always comes at the worst time in the season. We're very happy just to get out of there with a win."

Lisa Anna won both the shot (27-5) and the discus (80-6). Kim Hart placed second in the shot (26-11). Tracy Brod (79-4) and Sherri Novis (79-2) went 2-3 in the discus.

In the long jump, freshman Tracy Radke

went 14-1 1/4. Tracy Solomon 14-1 1/4 and Beth Christie 14-1 1/4.

Jenny Anderson won both the 880-yard run (2:41.0) and the 2 mile (12:47.3).

The Hawks also captured the 440 relay (56.8) and the 2-mile relay (10:36.8).

The Hawks are 5-0.

NORTH FARMINGTON stayed one step behind Northwest Suburban League-leader John Glenn Thursday by defeating Garden City 77-51.

Sophomore Tammy Spengler keyed the victory by winning both the 100-meter dash (12.99) and the 200 dash (28.84).

North won six of the eight individual track events and two of the four relays. Freshman Julie Garczynski won the 400 (1:04.6). Carolyn Alkon won the 800 (2:34.3). Barb Zeno won the 1,600 (5:56.8) and Donna Chuba won the 3,200 (13:01.6).

North took the 1,600 relay (4:34.4) and the

3,200 relay (10:55.0).

North is 2-1 in the NSL, 3-3 overall.

FARMINGTON cruised to a 102-26 victory over Western Lakes rival Livonia Bentley on Thursday.

The Falcons (5-2 overall) conceded only two events to the Bulldogs.

Tracy Jordan and Jenny Lindbert were the double winners. Jordan won the high jump (4-6) and the 300-meter hurdles (52.8). Lindbert captured the discus (83-6) and 1,600 (5:50.3).

Other Falcons winners were Kris Devine in the shot put (29-8). Alyse Fortune in the long jump (15-6 1/4). Laura Spence in the 200 (29.2). Alisha Richardson in the 400 (1:06.4). Bonnie Stecker in the 800 (2:41.2) and Nicole Jolley in the 3,200 (12:44.5).

NOTICE OF FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT EFFECT ON THE ENVIRONMENT COMBINED WITH NOTICE TO PUBLIC OF REQUEST FOR RELEASE OF FUNDS

TO ALL INTERESTED AGENCIES, GROUPS AND PERSONS:

On or about May 24, 1985 the above-named Farmington Hills, Oakland County will request the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to release Federal funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (PL 93-383) for the following project:

Grand River Intersection Improvements — extending the pavement 50' south of Grand River Avenue on Purdie, Colgate, Albion, Tulare, West Grayling, East Grayling, and Pearl, Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, 48114.

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly, the above-named Farmington Hills, Oakland County has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190).

The reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:
The project will improve existing roadway conditions and will not disturb natural features of the environment such as vegetation, water courses or wildlife.

An Environmental Review Record respecting the within project has been made by the above-named Farmington Hills, Oakland County which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying, upon request at the Planning office between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

No further environmental review of such project is proposed to be conducted prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County to the City Manager at 31555 W. 11 Mile, Farmington Hills, Michigan 48018. Such written comments should be received at 31555 W. Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, Michigan 48018 on or before May 21, 1985. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County will not require the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

Farmington Hills will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Farmington Hills is certifying to HUD that Farmington Hills and William M. Costick in his official capacity as City Manager, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, Farmington Hills may use the Block Grant funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) That the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58), and may be addressed to HUD at Department of Housing and Urban Development, Federal Building, 417 Michigan Avenue, Detroit, Michigan 48226. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after June 10, 1985 will be considered by HUD.
