A resident of Farmington Hills, Ellerbrock is senior advisor of quality assurance for the Sisters of Mercy Health Corp.

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

**SHARING MEMORIES**  
A "visitation" or "wake," or what others refer to as "calling hours," is a practice which allows family and friends — in the presence of the viewable body — to express together their feelings about the deceased.  
This sharing experience is nearly always important to the survivors. When the survivors do not share their grief, they face their grief alone. When they share their grief, "some touch of sorrow makes the whole world kin."  
Of course the survivors should have the opportunity to express their own emotions, in their own way. At the same time, it can be very enlightening and helpful for the family to hear what the deceased has meant to others. The visitation seems to provide a proper setting and climate for such sharing, a setting and climate which generally does not exist in any other way at any other time.  
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
