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

FORD WAS the Evelyn Ashford of the meet, winning the open 100-yard dash in 11.4. She also anchored Mercy to firsts in the 440, 800 and sprint medicy relays the fourth Farmington team in a row to win the meet, also got some valuable points in the open mile, where Ellen McCarthy finalished third, and the shuttle burdle relay, where they tiled for second with Farmington Harrison.

Franklin, which has been strug-gling in the Northwest Suburban League, turned in its best perform-ance of the year.
