Police tell story of freeway shoot out

Livonia Police Officer Gregory Henderson testified hast Thursday that hereturned gunfire on James Douglas Barton then turned his service revolver toward the man's two companions.

WOUNDED and stumbling from the WOUNDED and stumbling from the impact of gunlfre, Henderson said the was having trouble breathing and knew he was "bleeding hadly" when he shot at Barton. Then he pointed the weapon "in the direction" of Barton's two companions. Henderson had earlier ordered Arthur E. Sherman and Casimir (Charlie) Bagaclunis, 20, of Westland, out of the car and up against the passenger side of the Thunderbird.

Henderson said the men were "ad-

Henderson said the men were "advancing" and one had his hand in his pocket. Police reported that neither Sherman one Bagadunis were armed.

Sherman, shot once in the abdomen, was dead-on-arrival at Westland Medical Clinic. Bagaciunis was shot three times. As of Friday, he was still in Westland Medical Center listed in fair condition.

On three occasions during defense atterney Jim Rashid's questioning of Henderson, Wayne County assistant prosecutor John Sloan objected to Rashid's attempts to get the officer to admit whether any of his shots struck Barton's two companions.
"Do you know who you hit?" asked Rashid.

Sloan told Judge Robert Brzezinski the contents of a ballistics report being prepared by the Michigan State Police Crime Lab in Northville would be "an issue" when the rharing is continued on Wednesday, May 29. Sloan said his wit-

nesses will include three basistics ex-perts.

Upon questioning, Henderson report-ed that he had never before been fired upon or fired his gun in his "almost 13 years" on the Livonia force.

Henderson looked pale as he recount-der the part of questioning by Rashid, Sioan asked Brezinski for a short recess on Hen-derson's behalf. Henderson later asked to stay when his partner was called to testify.

Baron-Klask, who said he never

Baron-Klask, who said he never moved from the driver's side of the car, when the shooting started, said he couldn't see what was happening on the opposite side of the vehicle.

The officer, who was unburt in the incident, said he and Henderson first spotted the Thunderbird as it drove past their scout car which was stationed on Middlebelt Road, heading south toward Schoolerati.

south toward Schoolcraft.

It was shortly before 3 a.m. and the officers were suspicious because the backseat of the car was filled with some kinds of objects. Unaware of the robbery that occurred in Farmington Hills, the officers followed the car and then tried to stop it when the car, carrying three men in the front seat, made a right turn without signaling onto the

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Schoolcraft service drive.

Baron-Klask s aid both officers reached the car, each taking a different idie, at the same time. He asked the driver (Barton) for his license and registration and reported that the driver said he had just been "evicted from his house" and didn't have either. "Then, I received information from Officer Henderson, Charlie, there's agun in the car," he testified. "I saw Mr. Barton lean to his right end an orange flash from him toward Officer Henderson," said Baron-Klask.

THEN Barton drove away, said Baron-Klask. "As Mr. Barton pulled away, I saw the other two occupants lying on the shoulder of the road." Before Barton drove away, the officer said he saw him attempting to reload his sun.

Before Barton drove away, ne orre-cer said he saw him attempting to re-load his gun.

"I knew he and I were in a race to reload and that if I didn't (reload first)
. I wouldn't get out of there."

Baron-Klask said he landed in the middle of the freeway as he backed away from the vehicle while shooting at the driver. He said he tried to follow Barton, upon learning fienderson was still conzelous, but soon lost him.

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signiess in troot of the witness stand during testimony. Barton had been re-leased from the hospital the previous Saturday and walked with a limp in his left leg, injured by builet wounds received in the shootout.

Barton, who did not testify, also is charged with the use of a firearm in the commission of a felony. His court-pointed attorney declined to discuss his client's defense after last week's hear-

ing.

Barton and Bagaclunis face charges in Farmington Hills in connection with the armed robbery there. Barton is charged with three counts of armed robbery, one count first-degree criminal sexual conductand four counts of use of a firearm in the commission of a felony (second offense). Bagaclunis is charged with three counts of used robbery and three counts of felony firearm.

Barton remains in Wayne County
Jail on a \$500,000 bond. He was employed at Franklin Pastencer in Redford
Township at the time of the shootingrobbery. He had been paroled last January Irom the Southeastern Michigan
Prison at Jackson after serving a 26month sentence on an armed robbery
and weapons conviction in Wayne
County Circuit Court.
