Falcons win district preview with North

On Friday, North Farmington will host Farmington in a state Class A pre-district baseball game.

Monday, the two teams staged a dress rehearsal — one that certainly must have convinced North coach Irv Horwitz to schedule a few more rehearsals before the curtain opens Friday.

Farmington, a team that has suffered through a nightmarish season up to this point, banged out 11 hits in a 10-8 victory.

"I think we have been playing very well in our last few games," said Farmington coach Kevin Kamsman, who replaced Tony Wenson four games ago. "Just a couple of mistakes late in the games have cost us. We lost 2-1 to Walled Lake Western after leading going into the sixth. We lost in the last inning to Plymouth Salem, 4-3. Those

are good teams. We're not playing too badly."

The Falcons (8-14) scored seven times in the fourth inning off North reliever Tom Cotter. A three-run homer by Tom Sutton was the big blow of the inning.

North (11-8) rallied for five in the sixth and one in the seventh. The Raiders put the tying runs in scoring position with two out before Falcon reliever Dave Casaroli shut the doors.

Casaroli had a pair of hits and scored three times. Chris Green, Sutton and Jim Zang each had two hits. Steve Howell went the first six innings for the win.

Todd Shepard and Mark Dillman paced a 13-hit Raider attack with three hits each. Eric Engol and Steve Brown each had a pair of hits and Bob Chwalik boomed a 400-foot ground-rule double.

CANTON 12, HARRISON 1: Plymouth Canton, the No. 1-ranked baseball team in Observant, wasted no time in stopping a pair of impressive Farmington Harrison streaks Monday.

Harrison hurler Mike Inch had thrown 26 scoreless innings coming into the game. Canton greeted him with eight runs in the bottom of the first.

Harrison (10-10) had gone six consecutive games without an error — an extreme rarity in high school ball. The Hawks committed a throwing error in that first inning.

Dwayne Bennett's two-run double was the biggest blow of the eight-run Canton outburst. Walks and wild pitches contributed far more to the scoring. John Lenders, though, contributed a long pinch-hit three-run homer in the fifth.

Canton lefty Mark Coburn checked a

good-hitting Harrison team on just five hits — three of the hits came off catcher Mike Colovis' bat. Coburn (5-1) walked three and fanned nine.

The victory clinched the Western Lakes Western Division title for Canton.

"It's the first time in about three years I've been able to say this, but I'm very proud of these kids," said Canton coach Fred Crissey. "We lost our shortstop (Dave Knapp to an automobile accident), we lost to Salem on a dropped pop-up and had that nine games in a week stretch. If ever there was a team that could've folded its tent, it was this one. But, you know, we've gone 8-3 since we lost David. I think that says something about this team."

Harrison will host Westland John Glenn in the state Class A pre-district Friday.
