REMISSIONS IN ARTHRITIS HEMISSIONS IN ARTHHITS If you have arthritis, you may experience a remission: a period of time, from weeks to months, in which you note an end to pain and restricted motion in previously inflammed joints. When you begin a remission, you will may be on medication and bolieve that this thorapy is bohind your roturn to well-being. Hawever, in a remission, the improvement is more previonged and lactudes more joints than can be ascribed to the effect of medicine.

However, during this period, it is possible, with non exception, to minimize or even stop drug therapy and to undertake activities freely with-out concern that doing so will damage your joints. Keep in mind that rheumatologists talk about "remissions", not "cures." For just as inexplica-bly as the arthritis will leave for prolonged periods, so it has the habit of announcing its return with an unexpected flare.
