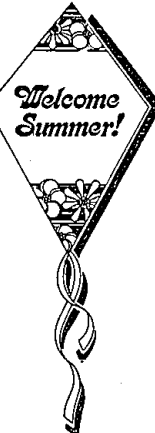

**REMISSIONS IN ARTHRITIS**

If you have arthritis, you may experience a remission: a period of time, from weeks to months, in which you note an end to pain and restricted motion in previously inflamed joints. When you begin a remission, you will be on medication and believe that this therapy is behind your return to well-being. However, in a remission, the improvement is more pronounced and includes more joints than can be ascribed to the effect of medicine.

It is unclear why remissions occur and it is impossible to predict how long they will last. However, during this period, it is possible, with one exception, to minimize or even stop drug therapy and to undertake activities freely without concern that doing so will damage your joints. The exception is in rheumatoid arthritis where continuation of gold therapy is in order long after inflammation has ceased.

Keep in mind that rheumatologists talk about "remissions", not "cures." For just as inexplicably as the arthritis will leave for prolonged periods, so it has the habit of announcing its return with an unexpected flare.

## Trustees debate public education

the schools," said Moran, president of the Parent-Teacher Association Council.

Parents should be told about what type of education their children are receiving, Brown added.

Clisback agreed with the idea of marketing the district.

"Private schools do do a lot of marketing," she said.

Taking the idea of marketing a step further, Allen, a financial manager with the Royal Oak Schools, insisted that students must have a hand in boosting a district's educational image by their academic talents and discipline.

The excellence of a school district should be marketed and advertised, and the best way is through parents and other community members, Allen said.

Bringing the community into the

schools will help the taxpayers see just what kind of education is being provided to the students, he said.

Ditzky, an assistant superintendent for the Jackson Public Schools, agreed that school officials should better learn to communicate with the public that supports the district.

But the district — parents and educators — must learn to have more self-confidence in the educational programs provided by the school system.

School officials must also look at the needs of the community in today's changing society. Freshness, for example, might be a program that's needed more or less than school officials would expect, she suggested.

King, an assistant prosecutor for Wayne County, agreed with Ditzky's idea of finding out what the community needs from its educational programs and school district.

"I think the schools have to be more flexible for working parents," said

King, suggesting the need for latch-key programs for the students, he said.

Krohn, who arrived at the debate late, indicated that the educational process involves not only a district's programs and teachers, but "support from home."
