Nevertheless, spending a few min-utes on burglary prevention is a good idea for vacation-planners, whether that vacation is to last a few days or several months.

Before leaving home, travelers should make sure all doors and win-dows are locked.

"Make sure the home is all locked up before you leave," said Officer Dennis Brills of the Farmington Hills Police Department, "Don't leave any windows

"If at all possible, lock the garage door, even if you have to put a padlock on it," Brills said. Leaving a garage door open could allow burglars to pull a vehicle into the garage, and then load it with the residents' belongings, without being seen by neighbors.

That trusted neighbor should know where to reach the vacationers in the event of an emergency. The neighbor can also keep an eye on the home, notifying police if something appears to be amiss.

"The whole idea is to make the home look lived in, like someone's in the house," Brills said, "That's one of the ideas of using timers."

Timers can be attached to lights and to radios within the home. They should be set up to correspond to the family's normal use patterns, rather than going on and off at odd hours of the day or night.

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




