

Students fill printing needs

or, silk-screen processing and by the end of year, students are learning how to deal with people — "the business aspect of it," Zaleski said.

Students even learn about the post office and the direct mail routes for much of their printed products. "Students will put them in trays for the postal routes," Zaleski said, of the newsletters students were printing last week. "The central office doesn't these until they get them in the mail."

"It's really a fun class. Most of the kids who take it have a lot of fun," Zaleski said, adding 30 students will graduate from the production arts program in the coming weeks.

DESPITE THE print shop's location in Farmington High, students from North Farmington and Harrison also are enrolled in the program.

"We are set up so if a student is at another high school, he or she can take this course," Zaleski said.

By the time the students who have taken both production arts classes graduate, they are ready for employment in an honest-to-goodness print shop.

"I probably have two job calls a week (for the students). And I can't place all the jobs," Zaleski said, adding "there is such a demand for printers."

Some of the students are also involved with co-op programs and work during the school day at one of the area print shops. Zaleski also hires some of the students on a co-op program during the summer to continue printing the district's publications.

Many of Zaleski's graduates go into industry as entry-level employees, he said. Others go onto a four-year printing management program. Still others own their own print shops or become managers for existing shops in the area.

"We try to teach a lot of responsibility," Zaleski said. "It teaches pressure and deadlines. When they get done, they feel good about themselves."

"We have enough printing (in) the school district to keep them in varied projects. We try to have a type of printing they would have when they are out in the world."

While the program is cost-effective for the district because printing jobs are done in-house, time, money and effort has been expended in keeping the production arts equipment up-to-date with the changing industry, Zaleski said.

"The equipment is always being updated," he said. "The school district is open to replacing equipment."

That's where the expense of the program comes in.

"It's a two-way street," Zaleski said. "The district gets cost-effective printing and it's a learning experience for the students."

Although Zaleski has been with the district since 1973, the program was actually started in 1969.

"It's come long way," he said. "The school district has really been supportive of the vocational education programs in terms of wanting it to grow." "We started out with the bare minimums," Zaleski said. "But in order to teach the students to go out in the real world, you essentially need the same equipment (as used in industry)."

While the equipment in the print shop is continually updated, the same goes for Zaleski and his students.

"It's hard for me to keep up with technology," he said, adding school officials are willing to send him to seminars and other programs to keep up with the changing production arts world.

"The thing is that they (the students) are just learning and being told it will change," Zaleski said. "So I try to instill in students that they have to be ready for change. The way they are doing it today is not the way they will be doing it tomorrow."

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Farmington Hills Planning Commission will give formal consideration to a proposed text amendment to the Farmington Hills Zoning Ordinance, Section 60.504, relating to Planned Residential Developments and the regulation of open space in these types of developments. On specific proposal would amend Section 60.504.A.3 to eliminate the words "for the use of the residents of the PRD." This proposed amendment and the general discussion of proposed amendments will focus on whether the open space dedicated in a planned residential development should be and exclusively by the property owners in the Planned Residential Development, or whether the open space regulation should be added to allow others to use the same as in the case of a private golf course developed as part of a PRD.

The Planning Commission invites all interested persons to present their ideas in writing prior to the meeting or in person at the public hearing above-mentioned.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order at 8:02 p.m. by Mayor Yoder on May 20, 1985, in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Bennett, Hartsock (arrived at 8:50 p.m.), Tupper, Walker, Yoder. OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Billing, Director Lauboff, City Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Baughy.

Minutes of previous meetings were approved. Council held a Public Hearing to review Special Assessment Roll 85-75, advising there was a \$2.00 reduction from the original estimates per front foot. Resolution No. 5 of the Special Assessment procedure was adopted confirming the special assessment roll as corrected.

Council held a Public Hearing on increasing property taxes and to review the 1985-86 proposed budget.

Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed. Council approved the Oakland County Urban System Task Force proposed redistribution of federal discretionary funds.

Council tabled the resolution on House Bills 4208 and 4207 relative to Public Safety Assistance Funds.

Council received and filed a resolution supporting Senate Bill 175, the "Chop Shop Act."

Council was notified of the Michigan Municipal League Annual Convention in September.

Council accepted the low bid of Cadillac Asphalt Paving Company at \$91,741.00 for construction of the 1985 Bituminous Paving Program.

Council accepted the low bid of G. V. Cement Contracting at \$44,755.25 for the 1985 Concrete Pavement Patching Program.

Council authorized a tri-party agreement with the State Transportation Department and the Oakland County Road Commission for administration of federal funds for Farmington Road/Freeborn Road Improvements; also an agreement with the County Road Commission for these improvements.

Council voted to inform the Oakland County Road Commission to include their proportionate share of pedestrian signalization of Farmington Road and Alta Loma in the Commission's 1986 budget.

Council authorized the expenditure of \$2,755.00 for new equipment and monthly charges of \$159.95 for lines and maintenance in adjusting the city's telephone service.

Council approved contracting with Neil Adams, Inc., for the construction of softball diamond lighting system at Shawwassee Park at a cost of \$17,000.00.

Council authorized acceptance of the Bloomington Foundation's gift of \$5,200.00 for a lawn sprinkler system at the Farmington Museum, also waiving the bid process and awarding installation to Joseph Hoffman, Lake Orion, Michigan.

Council waived the bid process and accepted quotation of Sewer Specialists, Inc., Owosso, Michigan, to clean the city's siphons in the Farmington Interceptor Sewer at \$110.00 per hour plus \$250.00 mobilization fee, and \$200 to \$300 per day for traffic control.

Public comments were heard.

Council adopted a resolution adjusting the fiscal year 1984-85 General Fund, Water and Sewer Fund and Highway Fund budgets.

Council adopted a resolution certifying Delinquent Special Assessment payments and Unpaid Invoice in the amount of \$23,899.85.

Monthly bills were approved for payment.

Meeting adjourned at 9:24 p.m.




