Tots must be buckled up

The motor vehicle accident is the number one killer and crippler of small children. Parents and grandparents should be aware that eight out of 10 accidents occur at speeds under 40 miles per hour. Children must be securely fastened in a safety seat or lap belt to avoid hitting the windshield or dashboard, or from being thrown out of the car.

The Oakland County Health Division's Child Passenger Safety Project

recognizes the need for continuing education and additional car seat rental programs with 23 loan-a-seat sites throughout the county.

During 1984, 2,107 infant and toddler seats were made available to residents. Fees charged for the car seat rental vary. Fees will waive or be lowered to accommodate low income clients.

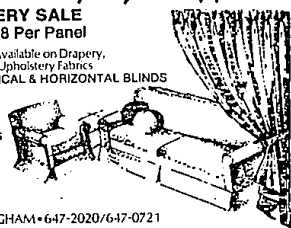
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
