Nicknamed the Mustangs, Portage Central finished second in the Big 3 Conference behind St. Joseph, which is a state semifinalist in Class B. "We lost two of our five games in one week because we got in a kind of rut with our hitting. But our defense was pretty solid despite hosses." 
