

House OKs aid to Contras — with conditions

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes between June 8-12.

HOUSE

NICARAGUA — By a vote of 248 for and 184 against, the House appropriated \$27 million over the next nine months in non-military aid to the "Contra" forces that are waging guerrilla war against Nicaragua's Marxist rulers, the Sandinistas.

The money was included in a catch-all spending bill (HR 2577) for the current fiscal year that later was sent to the Senate. This was a big victory for President Reagan because it resumed official U.S. involvement with the Nicaraguan rebels and turned up congressional support of his hardline policy toward the Sandinistas. The GOP-led Senate also has voted to restore aid to the Contras (below).

To win the House vote, however, the president had to agree that the money cannot be distributed by the CIA or Defense Department or used for any military or quasi-military purpose.

Also, Reagan vowed that his ultimate objective is not to overthrow the Sandinistas. He said he would consider direct peace talks with the Sandinistas, and promised to object to any atrocities committed by the Contras.

Supporter Robert Lagomarsino, R-Calif., referred to the presence of communism in the Western Hemisphere and said "those people who ignore this threat or who do not see it are the Neville Chamberlains of our day."

Opponent Gerry Studds, D-Mass., said that Will Rogers' 1927 statement about Nicaragua — "Where is Nicaragua and what the hell are we doing there?" — is as timely today as it was then.

Members voting yes wanted to resume American financial backing of the Contras. Voting yes: Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, and William Broomfield, R-Birmingham.

Members voting no: Dennis Hertel, D-Harper Woods, William Ford, D-Taylor, Sander Levin, D-Southfield.

CIA — The House rejected, 198 for and 232 against, a continuation of the

ban on the CIA or any other U.S. intelligence agency providing direct or indirect aid to the anti-Sandinista "Contra" rebels.

The so-called "Boland amendment" containing such a ban is scheduled to expire on Sept. 30. Its purpose is to keep the U.S. military from being secretly drawn into the Nicaraguan conflict.

Despite this vote, supporters were hopeful of extending the ban as part of separate legislation to be considered by Congress before Sept. 30.

Members voting yes wanted to continue the ban on the CIA providing covert aid to the Contras. Voting yes: Hertel, William Ford, Levin.

Voting no: Pursell, Broomfield.

EGYPT — By a vote of 110 for and 314 against, the House rejected an

amendment to delete \$500 million in additional economic aid to Egypt from a fiscal 1985 appropriations bill (HR 2577) that later was sent to the Senate.

With the extra money, Egypt is slated to receive about \$2.7 billion in economic and military aid during the fiscal year. The bill contained \$1.5 billion in extra aid to Israel, raising its total U.S. aid for the year to about \$4.1 billion.

Sponsor Hank Brown, R-Colo., said the amendment "is not a matter of liking or disliking Egypt. It is a matter of bringing some fiscal sanity to this country's economy and this country's budget."

Opponent David Obey, D-Wis., said the added aid to Egypt would be to undermine the Camp David accords and chances of reaching peace in the Middle East.

Members voting no favored giving

to the Nicaraguan Contras. Michigan Democrats Carl Levin and Donald Riegler voted no.

SENATE

AID — The Senate voted, 55 for and 42 against, to provide \$98 million in non-military aid to Nicaragua's "Contra" rebels over the next 15 months.

The money was included in a State Department funding bill (S 1003) that was sent to conference with the House. The Senate's terms for resuming aid to the Nicaraguan rebels were more to President Reagan's liking than those set by the House (see votes above). For example, the Senate would allow the money to be administered by the CIA and permit it to be spent for certain quasi-military purposes.

Senators voting yes wanted to provide "humanitarian" financial support

to the Nicaraguan Contras. Sponsor Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., said: "The conclusion is unmistakable. This administration is preparing for war in Nicaragua."

Opponent Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said that under the Constitution "only the president of the United States, under his power as commander in chief, can send troops into war."

Senators voting yes favored the amendment. Democrats Levin and Riegler voted yes.

Best medicine: Less fat, smoke

- A rather startling finding of a recent medical report is that prevention, through two simple life-style changes, has had more impact on reducing the death rate from heart disease than so complicated medical treatment. The two simple changes: reducing fat consumption and cigarette smoking.

- Unfortunately, there is no scientific evidence that grapefruit or grapefruit concentrate in a pill, contains enzymes that reduce appetite or increase the rate at which the body burns fat.

accounts for almost half the decrease in cardiovascular fitness that normally occurs with aging.

- When it comes to heart disease risk, recent studies suggest that where body fat resides counts more than how much fat there is. Tummy fat, in particular, increases heart attack risk dramatically.

- According to an American College of Sports Medicine position statement, exercising fewer than two days a week at less than 50 percent of maximum capacity and for fewer than 10 minutes a day is inadequate for developing and maintaining fitness in healthy adults.

- Although alcohol is not usually viewed as a performance-enhancing drug, some athletes believe it relaxes them. However, considerable research now indicates that alcohol ingestion causes a deterioration in motor performance, particularly in sports that require information processing and rapid reactions to changing events.
- Health conscious fast-food addicts, take heart: A national fast-food restaurant chain with more than 400 eateries in 24 states now provides patrons with low-fat, low-cholesterol, low-salt and low-calorie meals within minutes. Anyone for a plain turkey sandwich and an unlimited salad bar?
