# House OKs aid to Contras — with conditions

Here's how area members of Con-gress were recorded on major roll call votes between June 6-12.

NICARAGUA — By a vote of 248 for and 184 against, the House appropriat-ed \$27 million over the next nine months in non-military aid to the "Con-

months in non-military aid to the "Con-tra" forces that are waging guerilin war against Nicaragus" Marxist rulers, the Sandinistas.

The money was included in a catch-all spending bill (HR 2577) for the cur-runt fiscal year that later was sent to the Senate. This was a big victory for President Reagan because it resumed official U.S. Involvement with the Ni-caraguan rebols and firmed-up con-gressional support of his hardine poli-cy toward the Sandinistas. The GOP-led Senate also has voted to restore aid to the Contras febiowy.

To win the Rouse vote, however, the president had to agree that the money cannot be distributed by the CA or De-fense Department or used for any mili-tary or quast-military purpose.

Also, Reagan vowed that his ulti-mate objective is not to overthrow the Sandinistas. He said he would consider direct peace talks with the Sandinistas. and promised to object to any atroci-ties committed by the Contras.

With the extra money, Egypt is slated to receive about \$2.7 billion in economic and military aid during the fiscal year. The bill contained \$1.5 billion in extra aid to Israel, raising its total U.S. aid for the year to about \$4.1 billion.
