NICARAGUA — By a vote of 312 for and 111 against, the House adopted on amendment requiring a president to obtain congressional approval before sending combat troops into Nicaragua, except when certain emergency conditions are present.
Although Democratic sponsors termed the ban an important check on President Reagan, the president's supporters said they had neutralized the amendment by adding key exceptions during floor debate. NICARAGUA — By a vote of 312 for ad 111 against, the House adopted on

Because of the exceptions, the measure drew support from many of Reagan's allies.

The vote occurred during debate on the fiscal 1926 defense authorization bill (H.R. 1872), which was passed and sent to conference with the Senate.

Supporter Barney Frank, D-Mass, said the amendment deserves support from "those of us who are afraid that the president will abusively for political or ideological reasons" order an invasion of Nicaragus.

Opponent Dan Burton, R-Ind., said Reagan "has the ability and the wisdom to deal with the problems in our hemisphere, and throughout the world, and we should have more trust and con-

Opponent Thomas Hartnett, R-S.C., said it was wrong for the House to be "sending signals of weakness" at a time when America is "under sleep by terrorists all across the world.
