Boxing is back in Birmingham.
And promoters Harry Beleastro of
Birmingham and Leno Corradi of Troy
laim to make it quite a spectacle.
Beleastro and Corradi have assembled a lineup of professional boxing
matches — called "Uploum Thursday
Night, The Event" — scheduled to take
place 8 p.m. July 25 at the Birmingham
lee and Sports Arena.

The card, featuring 1984 Olympic gold medalist Steve McCrory, tenta-tively will include five fights. The other featured fighter will be undefeated

middleweight Steve "Stevie D" Darnell of Livonia.

It will be the first professional fight in the limingham for and Sporta Area as 16 1976, according to Birmingham Recreation Supervisor Robert Fox, the Birmingham arena hoted the Olympic Trial Quarterfinais.

Corradi, whose father Leo is Darnell's manager, said it will be a black-tie affair with ringide tickets available for \$100. Corradi also said former heavyweight champion Muhammad All will make an appearance.

Corradi. "It's a now market for us and we're accited.
"It's going to be like a night on the town for everyone. We're going to have a fashion show and a VIP cocktail party. We're trying to make it a little more than just a club-type pro boxing event.

"Downriver is known as a pro light-er's crowd," he said. "We wanted to bring pro boxing out to Birmingham." We wouldn't have done it if we weren't able to get into Birmingham." Corradi and Belcastro approached the city commission earlier this year requesting a liquor licease and use of the arens. Permission was granted with few obstacles, althoush some area

"The arena had the Olympic Trials in 1978, and from what I was told it was pretty well received," asid Fox, who has worked for the city of Birmingham since 1981.

"There's no question that we're delighted to have a facility for boxing and rent it out. I'm glad the building is being used. It's nice because it will generate some revenue. It's a building supported by the taxpayers, and it will lessen their burder.

McCrory, born in Detroit and the brother of World Boxing Council well-terweight champion Million McCrory, compiled a 125-15 amateur record.

He won the Golden Gloves tille in 1980 and cullminated his illustrious annateur career with a victory over Yugoslavia's Redzep Redzepovaki to win the 119-pound tille at the 1988 Olympics in Los Angeles.
