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Board trustee tells about Asian travels

Ditzhazy said she was also amazed at the fine quality of goods sold by locals for "next to nothing."

"Everything is less there," she said. "To us (Americans), who have more it seems like such a little amount because we have so much."

The school board member was also impressed with the willingness to change.

"There is a dynamic atmosphere of change in China," Ditzhazy said. "Things will change in China and change very rapidly. They already have in the past few years."

THE CONTRAST BETWEEN China and Russia was not as great as Ditzhazy anticipated.

"I was expecting a feeling of being constantly watched, but I didn't feel

that at all," Ditzhazy said of the group's visit to Moscow and Leningrad.

Generally, she said, the attitude of the Russian people depend on what U.S.-Russian relations are at the time.

"When we were over there (in Russia), President Reagan was talking about a summit with the Russian leaders, so the attitude toward Americans was favorable," she said.

"Russian people hear a lot of propa-

ganda about the United States, but there is a pipeline through the Eastern bloc countries," Ditzhazy said.

Russian people often use this pipeline to obtain books and information unavailable in Russia, she said.

"The way it (the pipeline) works is if a Russian can obtain permission to travel to another country such as Bulgaria or Yugoslavia they can gather information while there but usually can't bring it back into Russia."

The opposite is also true, she said.

"In this instance someone from another country can visit, bring books with them and then, incidentally, leave them in the house," Ditzhazy said.

The government still restricts the travels of Russians for fear of another revolution, she said.

"They (the Russian government), are afraid to let their people go out of Rus-

sia and maybe see something better and come back and start a revolution," Ditzhazy took slides during the trip and plans to put together a slide show. She hopes Farmington school administrators will be interested in viewing the show.

She will also make the slides available to teachers who are interested in showing their students the different lifestyles and educational systems of Russia and China.
