COUNCIL MEMBERS placed the or-dinance on first reading, prior to adop-tion but will discuss its ramifications with Oakland County Sheriff's Depart-ment representatives before formal adoption.

"The position of the sheriff's depart-ment is that if we adopt the ordinance, they will enforce it," Mayor Earl Bor-den sald. "They're not urging it, they're not opposing it."

Local members of Families in Ac-tion, an anti-substance abuse group, said they were pleased with the ordi-nance, despite council member's reser-

vations.
"I'm pleased with it. I'm pleased they said house parties' instead of open house parties." It could make a difference with invitation-only parties," Rochester Hills resident Hope Sadowski said. "I'm impressed by the fact that it's 18 years of age — that's great."

She earlier said the ordinance would "not be a solution, but it would certainly be a start. It would make parents think twice before leaving bome and leaving a child in charge. It would make them aware of the repercusaions."

THE ORDINANCE should bring parents out of their bedrooms and into direct supervision over their children's parties, Sadowaki added.

Offenders would be subject to a maximum \$500 fine and up to 90 days in jail.

In the past, group members said, courts have been too lenient to offenders convicted of using drugs, drinking or trespassing.
