Lawyer gets increase

had before," Mayor Jan Dolan said. "Basically, in business, you should have a signed contract for services you're performing."

EARLIER THIS YEAR, council members reviewed the legal consultants' services, hearing presentations from Paul Elbean's law firm and several others with municipal experience.

Council members agreed to extend the contract through the end of the year and then review those services.

"It's this council who will make the decision."

Under the agreement approved Monday, the attorneys act as general counsel for the city in all legal matters considered appropriate, represent the city in all civil matters and represent the city in the prosecution of ordinance and/or code violations of the city.

THE CONTRACT provides that the attorneys perform the following services:

- Attend two regular monthly meetings of the city council and one special

public hearing meeting of the city council;

- Prepare legal opinions on issues as they arise in the business of the city when requested;

- Attend the three regular monthly meetings of the planning commission;

- Attend the regular monthly meeting of the zoning board of appeals;

- Attend meetings of the administration as requested from the various departments' personnel;

- Be available by telephone or in person for advice to the administration, employees and staff when necessary and appropriate;

- Draft ordinances, code amendments, resolutions, agreements and other documents and reports requested by the city council, planning commission, zoning board of appeals, and/or city administration;

- Perform all other legal services deemed necessary or expedient by the city council and city administration.

For those services, the attorneys will be paid a monthly retainer of \$4,500, according to the contract.

Road widening project Wednesday, July 17.

The low bidder is South Hill Construction Co., with a bid of \$1,215,758. The company is also under contract to do the section of 12 Mile Road in Southfield between Telegraph and Northwestern Highway. The remainder of the project costs are for the undetermined expenses.

OTHER BIDS received were Cadillac Asphalt Paving Co., \$1,286,510, and Thompson McCully Asphalt Paving Co., \$1,300,276.

In addition, the project includes sidewalk construction on both sides of 12

Mile Road for most of the project.

"The next step is they have to have an award," said Tom Biasell, director of public services for Farmington Hills. After the award is made in mid-August, construction can begin, he said.

"They're still an estimate at this particular point in time," Biasell said.

The specifications call for the widening to be completed this fall with cleanup in the spring of 1986.

"The cleanup would probably be done in the spring," Biasell said. "We would anticipate by the fall we'd have that opened up (for traffic)."

The cleanup portion of the project would include the final grading and landscape, he said.
