Brooks wins 2 at Tri-city meet

Potomac Swim Club of West Bloomfield, spurred by double-winners Melissa Furst and Diana Perella and victories in four of six relays, splashed to triumph in the Tri-City League swim championships July 29-30 at Bloomfield Hills Labser High School.

Potomac scored 1,083 points to outpace Fox Hills Swim Club of Bloomfield Hills, which finished second with 994. Old Farm Swim Club was third (658), followed by Deerfield Swim Club of West Bloomfield (525), Beacon Square Swim Club of Southfield (452) and Farmington Hills Country Club (342).

Hurst, swimming in the 11-12 year-old girls division, shattered a league record in winning the 50-yard butterfly (32.17). She also won the 50 breaststroke (41.60). Perella's wins came in the 13-14 girls 50 backstroke (35.21) and 50 fly (31.31).

ADAM PAWLICK, swimming in the eight and under boys division for Fox Hills, broke a pair of league marks, winning the 25 back (19.19) and 25 freestyle (15.84).

Other league records were set by Justin Orlich of Fox Hills in the 11-12 boys 50 back (33.37) and Brita Brooks of Farmington CC in the 15-17 girls 100 free (58.96). Orlich also won the 50 free (26.17) and placed second in the 50 breast (37.72) to teammate Matt Pawlick (37.02). Brooks was Farmington's only winner, doubling in the 50 fly (31.74).

Potomac's girls 40-years combined free relay team was another record-setter with a clocking of 1:01.56.

Fox Hills had three other double-winners: Chris Jaffee in the 13-14 boys 50 fly (28.72) and 50 free (26.45) and his brother Matt Jaffee in the 9-10 boys 25 back (18.55) and 25 free (14.66), and Ashlee Finster in the 11-12 girls 50 back (33.61) and 50 free (29.20).

Other double-winners were Dave McCain of Old Farm in the 15-17 boys 50 fly (27.78) and 100 free (54.35); Mary Crimmings of Deerfield in the 15-17 girls 50 back (31.81) and 100 individual medley (1:09.45); and Steve Aulia of Old Farm in the 15-17 boys 50 back (29.84) and 100 IM (1:02.74).

Joining Barber, Michigan Runner magazine's 1983 Runner of the Year and a past Free Press marathon champion, and Caruso will be Doug Kuris (1984 Michigan Runner of the Year) and Kathy Grover. Keeler has tentative commitments from other highly regarded runners like Ron Lesard, Sam Torres, Gary Reffitt and Tony Mifend.

BUT A GOOD RACE isn't the only attraction. Last year the race was in November and poor weather hampered participation. With a summer date for this year's run, weather is bound to be better. Also, no other major runs are scheduled for that date.

But the prize list is what Keeler thinks will separate this from other runs.

"We have an extensive list of merchandise," he said. "A lot of people who couldn't win awards will get something out of it."

Included are such items as running shoes and apparel, magazine subscriptions, gift certificates for Racquet Unlimited, a co-sponsor and free dinners. Also, runners who get more than \$50 or more will receive prizes and be eligible for the grand prize drawing for a trip for two to Seabreeze Island, a golf and tennis resort in South Carolina.

Computer printouts will be available to runners shortly after completion of the race, with times, overall placing and placing in age group, pace and splits included.

THERE ARE five age divisions for both males and females: 19 and under, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49 and 50 and over. Trophies will be presented to all age-group champions, with plaques awarded to those finishing second through fifth.

Refreshments, ranging from yogurt and fresh fruit to bagels and granola bars, will be served after the race.

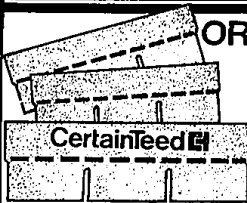

Entry cost is \$8. T-shirts will be given to the first 400 entries. Late registration and packet pick-up will be Saturday, Aug. 17 from 1-5 p.m. and Sunday, Aug. 18, from 7-8 a.m. at the Southfield Civic Center (on Evergreen between 10 and 11 Mile). The race starts at 8:30 a.m. Sunday, Aug. 18.

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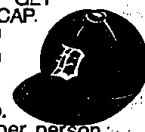
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
