When school starts next week, Farmington School District aturelants will be bringing beme eligibility applications for free and reduced price bot meals. Sponsored by the federal government, the National School Lunch Program is available to elementary, middle and high school students whose families can't afford weekly bot lunch fees, said Michael Howard, district food service supervisor. "It's a way of giving an adequate lunch," Howard said, "If you don't feed them adequated by the rest of the day as far as education is a waste."

In the 1985-88 school year, lunches will cost elementary students \$1.15 a day, middle and high school students will pay \$1.50 a day. Eligibility for free meals is based on household size and income. The income scale ranges from \$9,165 for a family
