Approve Library At Eagle

Eagle Elementary School, damaged by fire last spring, will be rebuilt with improved library facilities.

The Farmington school board approved the media center project recently which will bring the total spent on restoring the school to \$151,000.

The total sum for the restoration including media center of \$9,000 less than the proposed cost of returning the structure to its original condition.

Media centers have been scheduled for construction at several of the district's elementary schools.

The school board also approved a change in the plans for Harrison High. They ordered additional acceleration and deceleration lanes on 12 Mile Rd. in front of the new school. The Oakland County Road Commission requested the change to comply with new safety standards.

Another improvement project was referred to the building and site committee. A re-use compactor for Wood Creek Elementary School, instead of an incinerator, was recommended by Business Manager William Frisk.

Cost for the unit is \$4,200 compared to \$6,000 for an incinerator.
