

Harrison Opening Avoids Twin Schedule At North

FARMINGTON September 9 took on a new meaning for hundreds of Farmington youngsters Monday night when the school board announced Harrison High School will be occupied from the beginning of the school year rather than in the middle of the first semester.

The school district had planned to shift Harrison's more than 1,000 students to a "shared occupancy" arrangement at North Farmington High after the opening of the new school was apparently delayed.

ALTHOUGH the first two floors of the three-level building are not yet completed, the instructional area on the third floor will be available for classes for the beginning of the semester, school officials reported to a special meeting of the schoolboard Monday night.

Business Manager William Prisk said Harrison will operate on an early starting time for

the first three days of the semester, then switch to the regular high school schedule the first Monday of the new school year.

North Farmington will open Sept. 9 on the regular high school schedule, Prisk said. All three high schools will be operating on the same schedule by Sept. 14.

Because strikes and other construction problems slowed work on the district's new third high school on 12 Mile between Orchard Lake and Middle Belt, students assigned to Harrison were to have attended classes at North Farmington until the building was ready to be occupied.

The shared building means morning classes for North Farmington students and afternoon classes for Harrison students.

The transfer of students to Harrison was to have taken place sometime during the semester. Plans made for the mid-semester transfer helped

prepare for the earlier than expected entry into Harrison, officials noted.

Lawrence Schulman, Harrison principal, told the school board Monday night that a new bus schedule and new locker numbers were the only adjustments to be made in the change. No new student programs will be devised, he said.

SCHULMAN SAID Sept. 9 will be an orientation day, Sept. 10 a day of 15-minute classes and Sept. 11 the first full day of classes.

Some areas of the curriculum, he said, will be curtailed until further construction on the building is completed. The physical education, vocational education and home economics sections of the curriculum are to be housed on the first and second floors of the building.

Schulman noted alternatives for the programs are being investigated. He mentioned the school's swimmers may use

private school and club pools in the area.

As for other physical education plans, Schulman cracked, "We'll just have to do non-sweaty things."

Harrison's principal also noted there will be some gains in the earlier move into the new building. "Because of scheduling difficulties at North Farmington, woodworking and nursing arts classes were not scheduled. They will now be available for the first semester," he said.

Schulman said it is unlikely a hot lunch program will be offered at the building, at least for the first three days of the semester.

"We are exploring having our own hamburger and Coney islands outside," Schulman commented on plans for feeding youngsters.

HE SAID STUDENTS probably will be asked to bring lunches on Friday, Sept. 11, the first full day of classes. He said some arrangements for lunches will be made after that.

Schulman noted, "Not that brown-bagging it is so difficult, but I'm worried about kids leaving the area."

He pointed out Bliff and Jack-In-The-Box restaurants are nearing opening at 12 Mile and Orchard Lake and that walking along 12 Mile might prove hazardous.

Another safety factor concerning the new school prompted Board President John Washburn III to suggest hiring policemen to direct traffic at dismissal time.

Washburn said acceleration and deceleration lanes in front of the school will not be completed and traffic hazards could result.

School board members carefully questioned administrators about the move's effect on programs before unanimously approving the occupancy.

SUPT. RODERICK SMITH cited "school pride" and "the feeling of the community" as two factors in the decision to open Harrison while not yet finished.

"Our program will actually be a plus factor," he said.

Martinus Van Amsede, assistant superintendent for instruction, commented, "We won't be losing a thing."

Before voting on the decision at the public meeting called on Sept. 1, Van Amsede and Smith met with representatives of Harrison's architects and contractors, who assured trustees the work would continue on the building.

Apple Blossoms will be sold again in Farmington this Friday, Sept. 4, by Farmington Barracks 1152 of the Veterans of World War I.

Andrew D. Fletcher, post commander, explains proceeds from the blossom sale will be used to aid house-bound and hospitalized members of the Farmington Barracks.

THE BARRACKS, which is affiliated with the national organization, started in Farmington about 15 years ago and now has grown to 60 members. Most of the members live in

Farmington and many have lived here since birth.

Present members served in the Russian Campaign, in the Russian Polar Bear group, in France, or in the Navy — all during WWI.

About a third of the members are invalids and could use financial help, says Commander C. Mampel.

WHEN THE BARRACKS conducted its first Blossom Sale about five years ago as a fund raising campaign, the membership chose the Michigan state flower as their symbol.

The Blossoms will be sold at

numerous locations throughout Farmington this Friday.

The Farmington Barracks meets the second Thursday of each month at 1 p.m. in the American Legion Hall, Lake-way at Grand River.

All honorably discharged WWI veterans are eligible to join the organization and are welcome to visit at any time.

Roi P. Mathieu serves as adjutant.

The first Apple Blossom ever sold by the Farmington Barracks five years ago was purchased by Mrs. Winona Woods, then general manager of the Farmington Enterprise and now treasurer for the City of Farmington.

Local Dem Club To Hear Harris

FARMINGTON Fred L. Harris, Democratic nominee for U. S. representative in the 19th District, will be the speaker at a meeting of the Farmington Democratic Club at 8 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 3, at the First Farmington Savings and Loan, Orchard Lake near Grand River.

The 19th District includes Livonia, Redford Township and Farmington.

The meeting is open to the public.

Harris is expected to continue his criticism of Nixon administration economic policies which he says his opponent, as the incumbent congressman, supports without reservation.

"These policies have resulted in Michigan unemployment figures soaring to 9.1 per cent," Harris said. "At the same time inflation remains unchecked, interest rates are prohibitive and housing construction is down."

"The 19th District has been hard hit by the Nixon policies and those supported by my opponent. Both blue and white collar workers—including long-time technical, professional and executive employees—have seen their jobs eliminated during the two years of the Nixon administration."

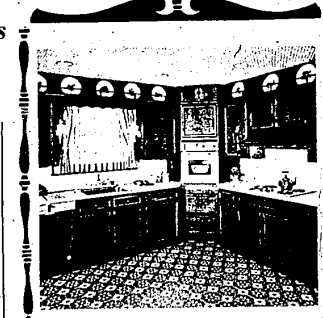
Extra Hours For Signup Announced
