Lower interest rate goes with greater safety

Last week we discussed the ratings of bonds by S&P and Moody's. This week we will discuss the meaning of investment and Speculative grades and the price of quality.

Investment and speculative grades

The investment grades include the bonds that in-dividual and institutional investors seeking stable income and safety ordinarily buy.

Income and safety ordinarily buy.

BBB/BBaa is the lowest rating that qualifies for commercial bank investments, but it's a borderline group for which, in Standard & Poor's words, and worse economic conditions or changing circumstances are more likely to lead to a weakened capacity to pay laterest and repay a principal than for bonds in higher-rated categories.

Below BBB/Baa you are in speculative territory. Bonds in the C and D ranks are in or near default.

Moody's and S&t''s don't always agree on a and's rank. It is not unusual to find an issue rated

Looked at another way, the higher the quality, the lower the yield. The risk premium — the extra yield on lower-rates issues — tends to increase during extended stock market declines and business recessions.

Presumably, unsettled economic conditions en-courage investors to concentrate on top-quality

Not all issues are rated. Those that are can be checked in Moody's and S&P's monthly bond guides, which should be available at brokerage of fices.

The big new issues are often advertised in somber 'tombstone add' in newspapers and other periodicals. But the ads may not tell you what the rating is or even whether the issue has been rated. The explanation lies in a somewhat condusing mixture of government rules designed to protein investors. Municipal bond issuers may advertise their ratings is they like. Corporate issuers may not.

Investments companies (municipal funds and unit investment trusts) may use ratings to describe

their investments. They might for example say a portfolio consists of A or higher bonds. The National Association of Securities Dealers says there are no prohibitions of Securities Dealers in the Company of the Compa
