

Pats dispute Canton win

Falcons fall to Spartans, North wins 2

Plymouth Canton's soccer team snapped a three-game losing streak Friday with a 5-1 win at Livonia Franklin.

Or did they? Livonia Franklin coach Doug Marks believes his team will get credit for a forfeit victory.

"Their coach (Mike Morgan) was thrown out of the game and they didn't have a legal representative of the team on the bench," Marks said. "Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) rules say that if a team doesn't have a legal representative on the bench, the game is forfeited."

Morgan was booted from the game after drawing two yellow cards from the officials.

SAID MORGAN: "The rule states that there has to be a representative from the school on the bench. We had one. A security guard from Canton was on the bench and Tony Shiner, my assistant coach, ran the team. The security guard was on the bench. That's why we brought him. Our athletic director (Paul Cummings) was there, too."

Shiner, although a state licensed coach, is an unofficial member of the Canton team. He is an unpaid assistant.

Marks said that the officials planned to file a petition with the MHSAA to award a forfeit win to Franklin.

"I guess the MHSAA will have to rule on this," Marks said.

Morgan was livid over the officiating.

"The referees were terrible," he said afterwards.

"It's just not fair for the kids. All you have to do to

become a high school official is pay \$15 and take a test. The state doesn't certify these guys. They couldn't even coach Bonanza Leagues, they're not qualified."

OU plays to scoreless tie

After all the criticisms of Oakland University's men's soccer slump are leveled, one fact remains: The Pioneers are getting their chances.

They just aren't capitalizing. OU visited Ohio Wesleyan Wednesday and battled the eighth-ranked team in the NCAA's Division III to a scoreless tie.

That might be viewed by some as an improvement after two frustrating defeats by East Stroudsburg and Bridgeport last weekend in the National Invitational Tournament, which OU hosted. But if it was, it wasn't by much.

In all four games the Pioneers have played this season, they have outshot their opponents by a wide margin. And yet all they have to show for it is a 1-2-1 record.

AGAINST WESLEYAN, OU had a 12-4 shooting advantage but never put one in the net. The Pioneers so dominated, they took eight corner kicks to none for Wesleyan.

Marty Hagen, from Troy Athens, came closest to

scoring when his head shot bounced off the crossbar late in the game. Gray Halzel also kicked a pair of shots at the Wesleyan net but failed to score. Halzel sparked for OU at midfield, and goalkeeper Paul Larkin earned his 30th career shutout, a school record.

The scoring problem haunted OU in its two previous losses. Against East Stroudsburg, OU had a 13-7 shot advantage, and against Bridgeport the shots were 24-9 in favor of the Pioneers.

OU hosts Central Michigan at 3 p.m. Wednesday.

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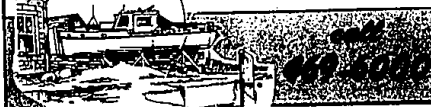
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
