

# Couple celebrate 50th anniversary

Ethel and Harlem Morris, whose roots run deep in the Farmington area, celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary with Real Estate One co-workers, then again with an open house for family and friends.

Ethel Morris was born on the 300-acre farm which was later developed into Glen Oaks and Canterbury Commons subdivisions and included a major strip of Orchard Lake Road where Real Estate One's national headquarters are now, north of 13 Mile.

Have you ever considered night lighting for your garden? This can be dramatic in an area you use for entertaining, such as a patio, terrace or porch — even for an exciting view from within your home.

Many people have permanent lighting installed while others prefer a temporary installation using outdoor electrical cords.

There is nothing more pleasing than entertaining in your home and having a lighted garden to give atmosphere to a party. I like light located at the ground level focusing on the trunk and branches of a deciduous tree. And don't discount the beauty of night lighting focusing on evergreens 12 months of the year.

You shouldn't have complaints from neighbors if you focus the beam upward to spotlight the leaves for many months of the year and in the winter to profile the branches and catch the glamour of snow on the branches.

Give it a trial. Try floodlighting on one artistic tree and decide whether the adventure merits more night lighting on your property. Remember, it is important to keep the light out of your neighbor's direct view.

In the Daves Arboretum Newsletter of May 1984, there was some interesting information. You can calculate the height of a tree if you can measure the length of its shadow. First, measure the length of the tree's shadow. Then, hold a yardstick upright near the tree in the sun and measure the length of the shadow cast by the yardstick. (All measurements should be in feet.)

USE THE following formula to calculate the height of the tree: X equals (S x A) divided by B, where X equals the height of the tree, A equals the length of the tree's shadow and B equals the length of the yardstick's shadow.

The formula works because the height of the tree divided by the height of the yardstick is in proportion to the height of the tree's shadow divided by the height of the yardstick's shadow, or X divided by S equals A divided by B.

This season you may be inquiring about using wildflowers in your garden. If you have enough space in your rear garden for a wildflower area, you may be interested in contacting the National Wildflower Research Center, 2600 FM 973 North, Austin, Texas 78725. This is a fairly new organization which is eager to entice new recruits who have an interest in wildflowers. This specialty quickly is spreading across the country.

# Body Recall begins campaign to promote seniors' well being

An introduction to Body Recall, a national lifetime fitness program, will be presented all day Saturday, Oct. 12 in Madonna College in Livonia as part of a statewide initiative by the Michigan Office of Services to the Aging (OSA) and the Michigan Department of Public Health (MDPH) to promote the health and well-being of older people.

Body Recall developer Dorothy Christman of Berea, Ky., and her travel team of older adults will conduct a physical fitness demonstration with audience participation.

This will be followed by a lecture. Christman will explain her method of easy exercise and how it works to assist adults in health-producing movement.

The program is part of a statewide promotion campaign by OSA and

MDPH in conjunction with Healthy Older People, a national comprehensive health promotion sponsored by the federal government. Its purpose is to

create greater health awareness and focus attention on disease prevention and the curtailment of health-care costs caused by preventable illnesses, injuries and conditions.
