COLLEGE ATTORNEY B. Gerald Bartush of Bloomfield Hills said Keley's duty is "to issue opinions on maters of law when requested by certain individuals." He said the opinion "is just that."

Bartush said Kelley's office "has no investigative powers. He bases his opinion on the facts as presented, it has no binding effect on anyone. . . They have no enforcement power per se. They'ro not in the enforcement business."
