The Farmington City Council will be presented with the annual audit of city finances for 1984-85. The council will also consider reorganization of the city's treasurer's department. Council is expected to discuss and take a position on proposed municipal liability reforms. Oakland County's proposed enhanced 9-1-1 emergency phone system will be discussed.

Trustees will review an audit by Plante and Moran, a Southfield accounting firm, for 1984-85. Library Director Beverly Papal will discuss the library system's 1985-86 with attention on the proposed Sunday opening hours and capital improvements. Their personnel committee will recommend policy changes for retirement and health insurance benefits. The board is expected to approve amendments to the bylaws, which reflect the additional number of trustees on the board.

"Closing the Gap: Marketing Energy Efficiency" is the theme of the fourth annual Community Energy Management Conference set for Oct. 29-30 at the Southfield Holiday Inn.

**SCIATICA**

In sciatica the cause of pain is compression of one more nerve roots as they leave the lower back to form the sciatic nerve. The nerve travels down the back of the thigh and then divides at the knee to provide nerve endings to the front and back of the lower leg and foot.

Compression of a nerve root is known as a "pinched nerve." Its presence is heralded by pain down the back, side of the leg, or to the foot. In addition the leg may begin to drag in a characteristic way known as foot drop.

The usual cause of sciatica is a herniated disc, that is, pressure on a nerve root by one of the components that make up the back. Rest, time, and in rare instances, operation, are the treatments most often required.

Since the pain can be near the knee of ankle, it is difficult at times to tell sciatica from the onset of arthritis. However, physicians are aware of the similarity and by special tests usually can identify which one of the two conditions is present.

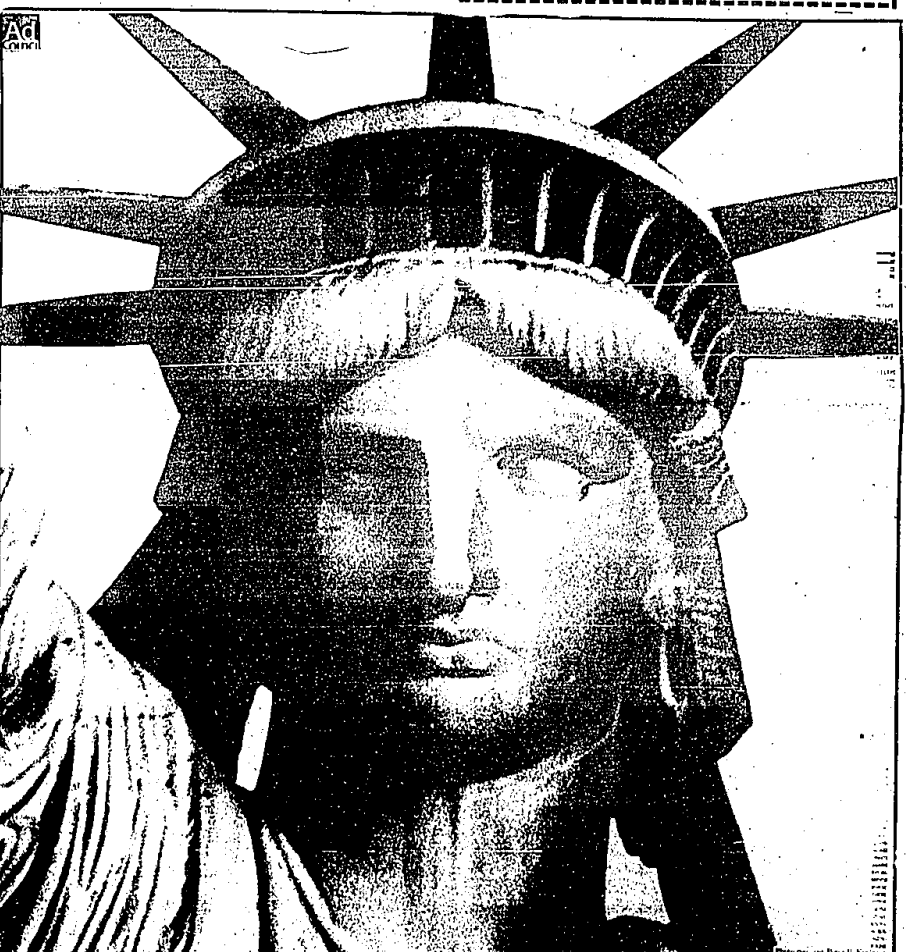

## If you still believe in me, save me.

For nearly a hundred years, the Statue of Liberty has stood on the edge of the New World, America's most powerful symbol of freedom and hope. Today the ravages of a century of weather and pollution have left their marks. Corrosion has eaten away at the iron framework. New holes continue to appear in the copper sheets that form the exterior.

Less than a mile away, on Ellis Island where the ancestors of nearly half of all Americans first stepped onto American soil, the Great Hall of the Immigration Center is in a similar state. Rooms are vandalized, passageways overgrown with vegetation, walls crumbling in decay.

Inspiring plans have been developed to restore the Statue and to create at Ellis Island a living monument to the ethnic diversity of this country of immigrants. But unless restoration is begun now, ceremonies marking the hundredth anniversary of these two landmarks in America's heritage could be held in commemoration of

national treasures that no longer exist. Sections of the statue have already been declared unsafe and closed to visitors. The 230 million dollars needed to carry out the work is needed now.

All of the money must come from private donations; the federal government is not raising the funds. This is consistent with the origins of the Statue. The French people themselves paid for its creation. And thousands of American school children contributed to its construction and to the pedestal.

The Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Centennial Commission appointed by President Reagan is asking every American business, every American citizen to join in raising these funds. The torch of liberty is everyone's to cherish. Could we hold up our heads as Americans if we allowed the time to come when she can no longer hold up hers?

One hundred years ago school children gave their pennies to put her up. Your dollars can keep her from falling down.
