## Balalaika group exposes audience to Russian folksongs

Most of you have heard of the balaialia, the Russian triangular in-strument with strings like a gultar. For most people, the sound of this instru-ment, even though quite familiar, does not evoke more than a passing interest, in spite of some polite denials.

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One group that has done a lot to present the balalaka to audiences here is the Balalaka Orchestra of Detroit. Its program last Saturday at Orchestra Hall was a celebration of that group's 59th anniversary.

As the list of performers and their instruments on the program suggested, what is commonly known as a balalaka is not a single, standard instruments of various ranges and sizes. This makes the group into something

analogous to a string orchestra.

WHILE ONE may readily notice the majority of Russian names among the performers, most of them were raised in this country, and are therefore removed from the folklore they were trying to perpesent. However, the dedication to these roots is deep and sincere. Part of the repertoire was agranged by Serge Larinoff, born in St. Petersburg cow Leningrad, who had been the director of the group for 25 years prior to his death in 1968. The present director, William Golden, proved to be a real virtuou on the instrument. His solo was especially impressive with one of the toding numbers, a Hungarian Dance by Husser, featuring passages which are more natural for the fiddle but ably performed on the balializa, in spile of the added challenges and awkward runs.

Many of the tunes on the program

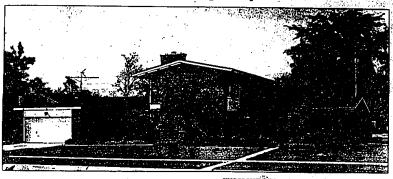
were familiar to those exposed to Russian songs.

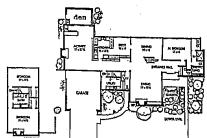
