## MercyCare is taking community's pulse

RIDGING THE gap between bigs-tech hospital emergency rooms and visits to private physicians.

That's the intent of MercyCare's first Immediate Care Center, on Orchard Lake Road in Farmington Hills.

Backed by the Sisters of Mercy, the recenter is directly supported by St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiae and Mt. Carmel Mercy Bopital in Detroit — itwo of five MercyCare hospitals in Noutheast Michigan.

The chief of emergency services at both hospitals, Dr. Thomas Patings, is the Immediate Care Center's director.

The center is staffed by St. Joseph and Mt. Carmel emergency room physicians. They spend time rotating between the hospital emergency rooms and the center.

A REGISTERED nurse, a registered radiology technician, a lab technician and a receptionist are on duty at the center 14 hours a day along with one

and a receptionist are on day at the center 14 bours a day along with one staff physician.

A person who needs an ambulance is not a candidate for care at the center, although if emergency service is unavailable, the center's staff can begin treatment, said Dr. John Walker, an orduty physician. All services are almed at area residents, he added.

Farmington Hills was chosen for the center because the two MercyCare bospitals sought communities where MercyCare services were untapped, said John Kerr, MercyCare executive vice president.

John Mari, Joseph Jordan Mercy's corporate head-guarters are also in Farmington Hills. Choosing the same neighborhood for the first Immediate Care Center was a community-service move on the part of the Sisters of Mercy, Kerr added.

"WE DON'T want to usurp private physicians," Kerr stressed. The immediate Care Center is designed to "againent (local physicians) services."

The center has the equipment and know-how necessary to start any medical treatment. A referred specialist takes over, or patients return to their regular physician siter treatment at the center, Walker explained.

"If they (patients) don't have a regular doctor, we'll find one, "Walker said." Simple (bone) fractures, lacerations, colds and poeumonia" are what these center is equipped to treat, he add-Zed.
