

More high tech at OU

Robotics, computer labs in expansion plan

An administrator from Indiana University, George Dahlgren, has been appointed the vice provost and dean of graduate studies at Oakland University (OU) in a nationwide search.

Dahlgren, who starts work at OU on Dec. 15, replaces George Peernan, who has taken a leave to work in Cairo,

Egypt, as a member of a U.S. educational team.

Dahlgren comes from Indiana University's Northwest Campus in Gary where he served as dean of academic affairs and facilities, overseeing 240 faculty members and 5,000 students since 1983.

His appointment was approved by

the university board earlier this month.

At OU, Dahlgren will teach chemistry. He once headed the Department of Chemistry at the University of Cincinnati (1971-78) and the Department of Chemistry and Electrical Engineering at the University of Alaska (1984-88).

He has a doctorate and master's degree in physical chemistry from the

University of Wyoming and a bachelor's degree in chemistry from Illinois Wesleyan University.

He served as vice president at the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia, Pa. (1978-83) and as dean of College of Arts and Sciences at University of Missouri-Kansas City (1975-78).

Indiana educator gets dean's job

Oakland University is asking for \$15 million in capital outlay funds for additions to Kresge library and Dodge Hall and to construct a new science center and animal care facility.

The projects were approved by the OU board of trustees in Oct. 2, and filed, as required by law, with the State Department of Management and Budget.

The university is also asking for \$1.5 million of its \$25 million request in fiscal 1986-87.

The trustees include \$225,000 to begin construction on a \$9-million addition to Kresge Library; \$1 million toward a \$3.5 million addition to Dodge Hall for laboratories in robotics, advanced automation, computer science, and industrial design; \$220,000 toward a \$12.2 million science build-

ing; and \$55,000 to begin planning for a \$58,000 animal care facility.

SCHOOL trustees have also requested an appropriation of \$32,820,000 for the state's 1986-87 fiscal year, an increase of 17.5 percent over current funding. The request was approved on Oct. 2.

According to OU, the major elements to be supported by the increase

are: salary and wage adjustments, a financial management information system, labor education and economic development, upgrading academic computing facilities, service to handicapped students, operating funds for the Dodge Farmhouse and Vandenberg Hall, a master of science program in health behavioral sciences and job development and cooperative education coordinators.

The appropriation request is part of a tentative operating budget of more than \$50 million being constructed for 1986-87.

A final budget will be presented to the trustees in mid-1986 when the university has a clearer indication of how large an appropriation it will receive from the state.

Area health care providers have a unique opportunity to learn how to avoid potential malpractice suits.

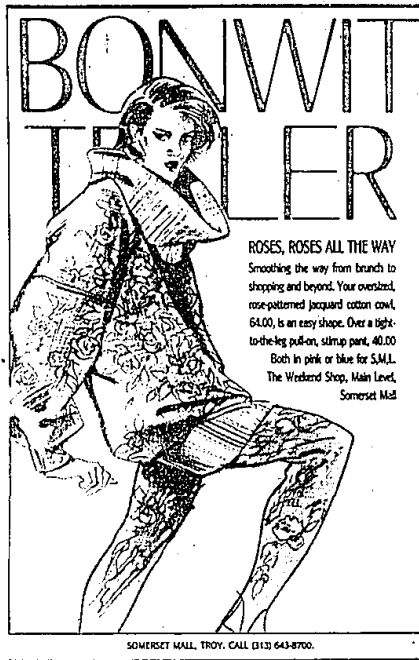
