Dhi you know that you can dramatically broaden your photographic horizons by using wide-angle lenses? Wide-angle lenses are truly exciting to use and are my favorite of all lenses. A wide-angle lenses are truly exciting to use and are my favorite of all lenses. A wide-angle insa will alter depth-of-field and perspective and give you a picture quite unlike what a normal or telephoto lens will produce. In thort, it's a lens that "sees" more, taking in a wilder capanse than other lenses. There are several advantages to the wide-angle lens. Second, you can get by with much alower shutter speeds with a wide-angle lens, a nice advantage when light is limited. The "rule" is that a lens can be had-held at the shutter speed closest to its focal length.
Therefore a 28 mm lens can be safe-thand-held at 1/30 second, with slow speed film, tow level light and a desire to maximize depth-of-field, this can be quite an advantage.
Try shooting a normal or telephoto lens at these shutter speeds and see your shaky results.
Many photographers ask about distortion, the bending of light rays characteristic of wide-angle lenses.

Sweeping forgrounds and bold sub-ject framing are easily attainable. And-you can deliberately exploit the wide-angle lens' tendency to exagerate tha-sits of close objects at the expense of distant once.

As he looks for new works, Bellinger keeps an ear out for 'a melodic harmony, and a musical challenge. "I ask myseli," how does it make me feel when I play it? It should have a good melody and rhythmic content. Does it appeal to the group? If they enjoy it, they will impart that joy to the audience."
