

Falcons gain special victory

The Farmington swim team won one for a special friend Thursday night.

Former Falcon swimmer Cindy Meli died Tuesday after battling leukemia. The current Falcon team dedicated its 114-50 win against Wallied Lake Central to the memory of its former teammate.

"Cindy was a special girl," said Falcon coach Bill McCord. "She touched so many lives — this was a special night."

Meli, 20 years old and a sophomore at Eastern Michigan University, was a state qualifier and captain of the Falcon swim team in 1982. She has been a coach at the Beechview Swim Club in Farmington for several years.

Farmington (5-3) won nine of 11 events. Carolyn Smith and Julie Kendall each won a pair.

Smith won the 200-yard individual medley (2:29.0) and the 100 freestyle (1:10.1), while Kendall won the 50 free (27.9) and the 100 butterfly (1:02.5).

The duo teamed with Betty Brown and Lori Kiel to win the 200 medley relay in 2:07.45.

Brown won the 100 backstroke (1:13.5) and anchored the winning 400 freestyle relay team, joining Stacy Schalm, Holly Chivers and Linda Deering on a 4:27.5.

Chivers won the 500 free (6:22.7) and Kiel took the 100 breaststroke (1:16.3).

FARMINGTON HILLS MERCY continued to roll through its dual meet season with a 7-1 dunking of Bishop Foley.

Jenny Morton captured a pair of firsts: 200 free (2:02.5) and the 100 free (59.0). She also swam a leg of Mercy's winning 400 freestyle relay, teaming with Lisa Kelly, Jenny Bedore and Cathy Lonsdale on a 4:00.5.

Bedore also won the 500 free (5:29.9) and sister Beth Bedore took the 200 IM (2:39.1).

Other winners for the Marlinus were Suzie Knipper in the 50 free (27.8), Erica Campbell in diving (159.7), Amy Cetnar in the 100 butterfly (1:08.8), Roberta Orr in the 100 backstroke (1:04.5) and Angie Harri-

Mercy is 3-0 on the season, 2-0 in the Catholic League.

FARMINGTON HARRISON lost a tough Western Lakes Western Division meet to Northville Thursday night 91-77 despite a pair of outstanding performances from Catherine Tucker and Diana Radtke.

Tucker won the 200 IM (2:25.0) and the 100 free (57.8), while Radtke took both the 50 free (27.3) and 500 free (5:40.7).

Margie Leto won the diving for Harrison with 118.45 points.

The loss drops the Hawks to 3-4 on the season.

NORTH FARMINGTON got back on the winning track after Tuesday's tough 88-84 loss to Dearborn with a 98-74 Western Lakes win against Westland John Glenn Thursday night.

Cindy Cramer led a North sweep of the swimming events setting a pool record in the 200 IM. Her 2:16.22 eclipsed Colleen Carey's 1984 mark of 2:18.50.

Cramer also won the 100 breaststroke (1:11.34).

Marge Cramer won both the 50 free (25.74) and the 100 butterfly (1:03.72) while Jennifer Rowe captured both the 200 free (2:00.01) and the 500 free (5:14.76).

Liz Worthen won the 100 back (1:08.49) and led off North's winning 200 medley relay, teaming with Cindy Cramer, Nancy Wetterholt and Amy Menelliey on a 2:03.47.

Jill Menelliey, Rowe, Laurie Oswald and Marge Cramer won the 400 free relay in 3:57.65.

Glenn's Jamie Koester took the diving competition with 229.85 points.

Pioneers battle back to upset Akron in OT

Raul Delgado said it best.

"It was a little intense but we pulled it out," the defender for Oakland University's soccer team said to coach Gary Parsons moments after the Pioneers joined the University of Akron 2-1 in overtime Wednesday.

"It's about time."

About time? Parsons and the OU players should hope it was in time. The win boosted the Pioneers record to 9-3-1, but three losses to NCAA Division II rivals may be too many to make the post-season tournament.

There was no denying that OU deserved the win against Akron. The Zips have had a problem similar to OU's — an inability to score goals. Still, they are a perennial Division I power and had an 8-3-1 record entering Wednesday's match.

WHICH MADE the game that much more important to the Pioneers. A victory would keep alive whatever slim hopes they still have for a tournament berth.

Forward Meally Freeman buoyed OU's post-season plans by burying Mike Vigh's perfect centering pass from the right wing into the corner of the net with 6:38 left in the second — and last — 10-minute overtime. It was Freeman's second goal of the game, but it was Vigh who made the play.

The midfielder got control of the ball near the center line and broke down the wing as the Akron defenders pushed forward, trying to force an off-side.

"(Akron) runs an offside trap," explained Parsons. "They'll bring their defenders up and try to catch you offside. We worked for the last two days on how to break it. We got caught (offside) maybe a half-dozen times but we also broke it a few times. That's how we scored our winning goal."

OVERTIME MIGHT not have been necessary had OU capitalized on a few golden scoring chances. Akron took a 1-0 lead with 4:15 left in the first half when Danny O'Donnell converted a Les Borowski pass.

The Pioneers tied it 14 minutes into the second half, thanks to some careless play by a Zip defender who tried to clear the ball back to his goalkeeper. Freeman intercepted the lazy pass and punched it into the net to knot it at 1-1.

OU played with intensity, but, just as in many of their earlier games this season, the Pioneers scoring opportunities ended in frustration. Both Freeman and midfielder Gray Halsei broke in free on goal in the second half, but Freeman shot high and Halsei rolled the ball wide.

"We needed this game," a happy Parsons said afterwards. "We needed it real bad. This is the first time we've played really well and come out on top. Akron is definitely the best team on our schedule."

"If we had lost this game I don't know what I could have done to get the guys ready for the rest of the season."

Fortunately, he won't have to face that problem. As Parsons said regarding the playoff picture, "This puts us right back in it."

Raiders 'fight' to a tie

Although Livonia Stevenson has wrapped up first place in the Western Lakes Soccer League, second place was still at stake last week.

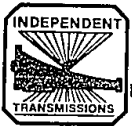
Cindy Churchill, Livonia Churchill clinched the runner-up spot with a 3-1 triumph over visiting Plymouth Canton.
