

# Krafsur seeks an All-American year

David Krafsur started working for the NCAA cross-country championships about a year ago.

That's when Krafsur discovered he was the 28th American to finish in the 1984 NCAA finals. The top 25 earn all-America honors. Krafsur missed that goal by three seconds.

"Since I did that last season, I had a lot of confidence coming into this season," said Krafsur, a former prep standout at Southfield-Lathrup now in his senior year at University of Tennessee. "I was hoping to be our No. 1 man this season."

So far, Krafsur has accomplished all the goals he set for the current cam-

paign. In five meets he has finished first overall three times. At the eight-team University of Mississippi Invitational last week, he captured top honors in a personal best 24:14 over the five-mile course.

IF ANYTHING surprises Krafsur regarding his success thus far, it's how early it's arrived. He didn't follow his normal summer training regimen, running long distances to build up a base for the fall season. Instead, he trained hard through June and July for the Maccabiah Games in Israel.

"I really wanted to do well over there," he said. "So I trained real hard. Usually, I just go distances."

Krafsur finished fourth in both the 5,000-meter and 10,000-meter runs at

the Maccabiah Games, returning to Southfield late in July knowing that he would have to start working for the start of another season.

That's when Krafsur decided to diverge from his normal training. He rested through August, cutting his mileage from a normal 85-95 per week to 35.

"I think it really helped, not hurt," said Krafsur. "If I had started in training long distances, I would have burned out."

BURN OUT is easy for a distance runner to do, particularly when he's competing in three sports. Krafsur must train for cross country, indoor track and outdoor track. That means training and working to a peak three times a year, which is no easy task.

"Runners who are out of college can build a good, long base for six months," Krafsur said in comparison.

His change in training helped him come back fresh, and his performance to date indicates he should do well in the three big events that await him in November: the Southeastern Conference Championships Nov. 8, the NCAA District III meet Nov. 18, and the NCAA Championships Nov. 25.

"I definitely want to make all-American," said Krafsur. "If I have a race within myself, I should make it."

cross country season. He finished third in the 10,000-meter run at the SEC outdoor track finals last year and has hopes of making great improvement.

"I'm hoping to make some national team next summer," he said. "If I can bring my time down, below 29 minutes in the 10,000, I should have a shot at one."

But there's a lot of hard training miles to negotiate between now and then, as well as preparation for two more running seasons. For now, Krafsur wants to attack one obstacle at a time.

# Albion's Kish falters in 1st start

## ALBION VS. ADRIAN

Observer & Eccentric area players will play key roles Saturday when Albion and Adrian hook up for the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association football championship at Albion.

For Albion (3-0, 5-1), Ed Ewald (Redford Catholic Central) and Ken Kish (Farmington Harrison) are vital to the Briton hopes. Ewald is Albion's second-leading tackler with 40 solos, 43 assists. In Albion's 18-14 win against Olivet last week, Ewald recovered a fumble and picked off a pass to set up two of the Britons scores.

Kish, who had been used in a relief role, got a start last week at quarterback and was ineffective. Before being relieved in the third quarter by Dave Yaw, Kish completed two of 11 passes with one interception.

Garden City's Charlie Wasczenki, John Glenn's Dan Strehl and Garden City's Steve Freiler have also been keys to the Albion defense.

Adrian (3-0, 5-2) is led by Rochester quarterback Bruce Crosthwaite. In the Bulldogs' 70-6 rout of Alma last week, Crosthwaite completed 19-of-22 passes for 291 yards and two TDs. On the season, he has hit on 107-of-163 passes for 1,437 yards and 13 TDs.

Plymouth Canton grad Matt Santilli is among Adrian's leading tacklers with 44 from his corner-back spot.

### JUREK GETS START

Eastern Michigan football coach Jim Harkema said that he expected Plymouth Salem grad Scott Jurek to see a good deal of playing time this season.

Well, eight weeks into the MAC season and Jurek is the Huron's starting inside linebacker.

He is the third leading tackler on the team with 54 (23 solo and 31 assists). In Eastern's 17-10 loss at Central Michigan last week, Jurek recovered a fumble.

Another area product is performing well on the Huron defense. Junior Mike Skiver (St. Agnes), Skiver, a rover back, has been in on 53 tackles, made two interceptions and returned one for a TD.

### STEBBINS A STANDOUT

Against EMU Saturday, Central Michigan tight end Bob Stebbins (Livonia Franklin) caught four passes for 38 yards including a brilliant one-handed stab for a TD.

On the season, Stebbins has caught 18 passes for 150 yards.

He has also been an effective blocker for the Chaps. He brought ooba and ahs from the crowd last week with a jarring block on EMU's Jurek.

### ELECTIC TRACY

Michigan Tech's Steve Tracy (Livonia Churchill) has found five different ways to score this season. He's caught a pass for a TD, returned a punt for a TD, kicked a field goal, kicked nine extra points and caught a pass for a two-point conversion.

### Proposition A

Shall Section 2.05 of the City Charter for the City of Farmington Hills be amended to provide that newly elected Council members shall take office at the first regularly scheduled Council meeting following certification of the election rather than on January 1, following the election?

### Proposition B

Shall the City Charter, Subsection C of Section 2.05 relating to the filling of Council vacancies be amended to provide that vacancies in a Council position shall be filled at the next odd year general election rather than at the next November general election?

### Proposition C

Shall the City Charter of the City of Farmington Hills, Section 5.01.C. and 5.02.A. be amended to eliminate the need for a primary election for nomination of candidates to the City Council?

Shall the City Charter of the City of Farmington Hills, Section 3.02.C. be amended to allow members of Boards and Commissioners to become candidates for election to the Council without first resigning from said appointed positions?

Meetings of the Board of Review, be amended to change the convening date of the Board of Review to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March to review the assessment roll, and to change the public hearing dates to begin on the second Monday in March, and to provide notice requirements to all property owners when their assessed valuation is increased?

Election Law, Act 114, P.A. 1984

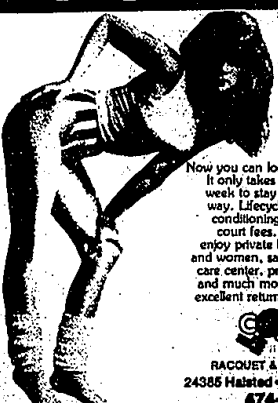
