

Regional berth nears for Pioneers

What slim hopes Oakland University's men's soccer team had for an NCAA Division II playoff berth seemed to dip even further after a 2-0 loss to Gannon University Oct. 19.

But the Pioneers have rebounded with five straight wins, including a pair against tough Division I schools. OU beat University of Akron 2-1 in overtime Oct. 23 and last Sunday jolted Illinois State 2-1 behind Marty Hagen's strong offensive play. Both teams were ranked in the Midwest Region in Division I.

The Pioneers' win over ISU was the second in a weekend road trip. On Saturday, OU was a 4-1 winner at University of Wisconsin-Parkside. The victories improved the team's record to 12-2-2 with two games left, including a pivotal home contest against regional foe Wright State at 2 p.m. Saturday.

If OU CAN close out with a pair of wins, it would have a solid chance of making the playoffs for the fourth straight year. The Pioneers moved up to second in the Great Lakes Region

In the latest Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America (ISAA) coaches' poll, trailing only New York Tech (15-2-1).

Two teams from each of six regions make the NCAA Division II tournament, but the selection committee is not bound by the ISAA poll. Also, the

team ranked just behind OU, Davis and Elkins (10-2-3), won the National Invitational Tournament at OU Sept. 15. OU finished fourth, but never played D-E.

The tournament bids and pairings will be announced Monday.

OU SCORED twice in the second half to knock off ISU. Hagen scored the game's first goal at 61:49, nearly 17 minutes into the second half. Chan-Ho Allen assisted. For Hagen, a junior forward from Troy, Ala., the goal was his seventh of the season — six of

which are game-winners.

The Pioneers' Mark Christian made it 2-0 less than eight minutes later. Hagen assisted, chipping an indirect free kick to Christian. The Redbirds (10-3-3 for the season) closed to within a goal two minutes later, Frank Palumbo scoring, but the OU defense, with Dave Marilla in goal, held.

AT WISCONSIN-PARKSIDE Hagen got OU going early with a goal at the 2:35 mark. Hagen's goal followed a Brian Fitzgerald head pass off of Mike Vigh's corner kick.

OU spikers 4th in Can-Am nets

Oakland University's volleyball team warmed up for this weekend's Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) tournament by finishing fourth in the 10-team Can-Am Tournament last weekend, hosted by the University of Windsor.

OU won its pool with four straight wins over Ontario-based schools Friday. The Pioneers defeated University of Waterloo 15-4, 15-4; University of Windsor 15-11, 15-4; Lakehead College 15-11, 15-10; and Brock University 15-11, 15-6.

On Saturday, the Pioneers upended Michigan Tech 15-13, 15-13 in the quarterfinals before losing a tight semifinal match to GLIAC rival Grand Valley State 15-17, 15-17.

BECCA WYATT had 57 kills with a .345 attack percentage, 21 service aces, 27 solo blocks and 12 block assists for the tourney. Wyatt finished the season atop the GLIAC statistics in blocks (1.78 per game) and serving aces (0.87 per game). She was also seventh in attack percentage (.315).

OU, which finished in a tie with defending GLIAC champ Ferris State and GVSC for the regular season conference title, was granted the No. 1 seed based on most games won in head-to-head competition. The GLIAC tournament will be hosted by Lake Superior State starting Friday.

Also among the league's statistical leaders for OU were Mary Pike, third in service aces (0.77 per game) and fifth in attack percentage (.305); Bridget Ehnert, fifth in blocking (1.10 per game); and Judy Jenner, who led the circuit in assists (10.3 per game).

Gordon said. "But obviously they're pretty much the same as last year."

Even with the loss to graduation of All-State receiver Cedric Gordon, the Pioneers are still an explosive team, according to Gordon.

"THEY'LL START OUT running until you can stop them and then they'll throw on you like crazy," the Glenn coach said. "Our defenses are similar, but their offensive line is huge."

"Their two offensive tackles go 270 and 280 pounds. It's going to be up to our defense to take them."

Pioneer's quarterback is Adam Burns, a threat to run and pass.

The Pioneers' top running back is Brian Voeltech, a 6-foot-1, 195-pound senior and son of University of Michigan assistant Milan Voeltech.

"We're going to have to mix up the run and pass," Gordon said. "We've got to mix things up and play good defense against them."

"They're explosive. They've scored well over 200 points. To be honest, I see no weaknesses."

Glenn also poses numerous problems for Pioneer.

TONY BOLES, a 6-foot-2, 198-pound senior, has run for more than 200 yards the last two games, bringing his season total to 1,324.

Quarterback Steve Irwin, a 6-1, 205-pound senior, has been on the mark of late with his passes to Chuck Hammon, his primary receiver.

But during Glenn's perfect regular season, the Rockets have had some unsung heroes like two-way tackle Don Croft, 154-pound nose guard Ron Keast, tight end/defensive end Rick Hassen and offensive tackle Steve Murray.

"Croft's just had a great year for us," Gordon said. "And Rick Hassen has been our punter. Murray is a workaholic. He's our most-improved player."

If the game goes down to kicking, Glenn may have the edge in junior Tony Svaluto, who has kicked six field goals and a 22 of 25 extra points. Game time is 7:30 p.m. Friday, Pioneer is at 601 W. Stadium, Ann Arbor.

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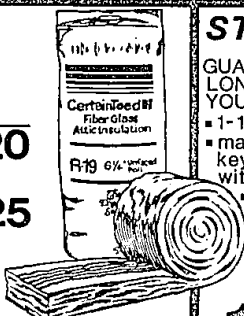
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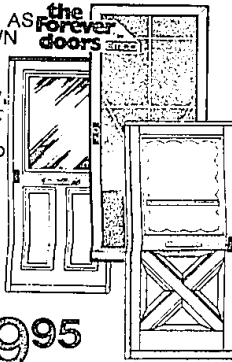
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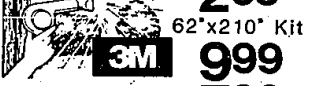
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
