"It's a bit rare when all parties are in agreement," said state Rep. John Bennett in a pollitical understatement. After 45 years, the first major change in Michigan banking laws sailed through the House of Representatives last wock, was assured of passage in the state Seate and was embraced by Gov. James J. Blanchard.

The bill would permit statewide branch banking for the first time since the Great Depression and interstate banking for the first time is history.
