Concerns cloud **Lady Pioneers**

Perhaps what occurred at the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic

Perhaps what occurred at the Great Lakes intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) preseason meeting was as good an indication of what to expect from Oakland University women's basicball team as any.

The Pioneers finished fifth in the final caaches poll, even though two coaches thought enough of them to pick them (Iris. In other words, no one really knows what to anticlepate from Oil and "lirst year" coach Sue Kruszewski. OK, Kruszewski inn't in her first year as OU's coach. It's her third season. But the team on the court this year will be the first one she recruited. And that means the Ploneers will play her brand of basketball. "Our strength will be in our defense and our running game," said Kruszewski, who guided OU to a 15-11 mark her first season and a 14-14 record last year. "We'll have a fast-break offense. It's my natural style as far as coaching."

NO WONDER her fellow GLIAC

NO WONDER her fellow GLIAC coaches are somewhat puzzled. For the past two years OU relled on its inside strength and with two good reasons: Brenda McLean, a four-time all-GLIAC center and forward, and Kim Nash, a 6-3 center. Now Kruszewski has "elected to go with a smaller, quicker lineup. We're not going to have the strength inside which obviously was our forte the last two years."

Kruszewski will need two elements to fuel her running game: rebounding, which means her smaller, unproven front line must produce, and ballhan-dling, which was a sore spot last sea-

ulling, which was a sore spot last season.

"True, ballhandling was a problem,
but it wasn't because of a lack of ability as much as a lack of experience,"
she said. Translated, that means
Kruszewski has great confidence in
sophomore Margaret Boyle, who
showed flashes of: brilllance as a
freshman but was also inconsistent.

"She will definitely be our point
guard," said Kruszewski. "She's playling much more under control and
she's more intelligent in her passing.
She also has a strong outside shot."

AND THOSE aren't even her strongest points, according to her coach. Boyle's greatest assets are ther defensive ability to put pressure on the ball and her ability to drive to

Boyle's development will allow three other players — all seniors who transferred to OU from junior colleges — to switch to more natural positions after trials at point guard last

Julie Wilga, from Livonia Franklin and Henry Ford CC, and Kris Brown, from Maceunb CC, are both 5-8 natural shooting guards. Brown was being groomed at the point last season before she was sidelined with a knee injury, prompting Wilga's insertion at that position.

Those two are currently battling shooting guard spot. Wilga averaged, 7.5 points per game a year ago, to 5.4 for Wilks and 3.1 for Brown.

"Sarah's really improved and developed her shot," said Krusszeski, "and shots penetrating more to the basket,"

"If we want to go with a taller lineup, she can come in and give us some points."

Pioneers better, so are foes

This doesn't sound like Greg Kampe.
"Tm excited about this season," said the Oakland
University men's basekellal coach who three weeks
ago at the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic

"I think we're going to surprise some people," be

What changed his mind?
For starters, its starters — seven of them to be
exact, back from last year. All filled starting positions at some point in Kampe's initial season as
OU's head coach, and all are improved this season.

THEN THERE'S three promising freshmen whom Kampe wants to bring along alowly. He hopes that by the start of the GLLAC season they should be ready to contribute productive minutes. None will start, according to Kampe's present plata, but they will play.

And Inaily, there's the exhibition game OU played against the Windsor Baskethall Club Not. The Pioners posted a 105-20 velory that gave both the coach and the team a shot of contidence. "We played very well as our exhibition," Kampe said. "I'm pretty pleased with our progress. I'm fact, the OU coach is having a problem finding areas of concern. He had no such trouble a year ago. When the season opened the team was still working on learning his defensive concepts, with the oftense lagging further behind. OU finished 13-15 overall and seventh in the GLIAC with a 5-11 mark.

"I DEFINITELY think we're better today than at any time last year," he said. "We have nine or 10 players we can put on the court that I have confi-dence in."

Leading the pack of Pioneers is senior Chris Howre, a 6-foot-3 forward and Orchard Lake St. Mary's grad who is being touted as an All-Ameri-can candidate. Howe averaged 18.3 points, 6.8 re-bounds and 3.0 assists a year ago, connecting on 51.8 percent of his floor shots and 78.8 percent of

INJURIES PLAGUED OU even before last season got under way. Tout was expected to be the shooting guard until he sprained a knee ligament in preseason offills. He never did regain full effectiveness but is fully recovered this year.

Dixton followed Tout it of the sidelines with a broken ankle after 11 games, seriously damaging OUs inside game. Kampe was forced to lasert Billinger and Schibl into the lineup more than be wanted. But last year's problems are this season's strengths. With the injured players back and Biltinger and Schibl experienced veterans, the Pioneers have a luxury Kampe never had — depth.

"There's no question we're going to substitute a lot more," be said. His plan is to use eight players for the first five games, then rotate 11 into the lineup for games sits through 12. "After that, we'll evaluate what we have and make any necessary adjustments," he said.


